### Begging Letters

We have received a letter from Morley Pettit asking us to announce that the annual convention of the Ontario Beekeepers' Association will be held in Toronto on Nov. 13, 14 and 15. We usually comply with such requests without comment, but similar requests reach us daily. The Government departments are among the worst offenders in this respect. If a meeting is to be held at either one of the Agricultural Colleges, if some new seed is offered the farmer, or if instructions are being issued to spray trees or for any other purpose we are coolly asked by letter or circular to make the intentions of the department public. The Government's old age pension scheme has also supplied a large quantity of deadhead advertising, as have most of the other departments. Now The Record is always willing and glad to second the efforts of these various societies or the Government Departments in anything that is for the public good. But we submit that the newspaper press should not be taken up with announcements that no business firm could get inserted without paying advertising rates for them. Why, for instance, should we be asked to publish the benefits which accrue to becoming a participant in the Governments of old age pension scheme, when insurance companies have to pay for similar announcements? Why should we be asked to publish the terms and curriculum of a Government College for nothing, when other colleges have to pay? The newspapers are not charitable institutions. Governments should be above playing the dead-head dodge. It takes a lot of money to run an up-to-date modern newspaper, and the proprietors of such should not be asked to give their valuable space away for nothing. As well ask the butcher and the baker and all other tradesmen to give of their goods for nothing. How often will it be necessary for newspapers to make an announcement of this kind.

### Early Christmas Shopping

The holiday season is not as remote as it may seem to be when we come to think about it; and hence it is about time for citizens to think about what they are going to buy but when they are going to buy it. Such a course will result in much good. It will redound to the buyer's benefit. It will help the tired employes who, in retail establishments, must bear the burden of the Christmas rush, and will, by just so much, brighten the holiday season for them. Do your Christmas shopping early.
