CYNTHIA GREY'S ANSWERS.

Dear Miss Grey—Please tell me a simple way to make hair-dyes—carry over.
A—Buy a box of waters or carry over. The mixture for these is simple: a Farber beat the white of an egg and add to it about a teaspoon of sugar. To this put half a cup of sugar. Stir, chopped finely. Walnuts are nice. Use a hair brush, spread some of the mixture on each water or cracker and then put the whole in the oven to brown.

Dear Miss Grey—What do you use for mint sauce and how is it made?—Young Cook.
A—Mint sauce is used correctly with roast lamb and mutton. Cut up several pieces of mint, the largest and put over half or two-thirds of a cup of vinegar in which you have previously put one or two spoons of white sugar and a pinch of pepper.

Dear Miss Grey—(1) Can you tell me where I can get new coats, books which are worn on the outside, "Jane Eyre," "The Scarlet Letter," etc., in German?—Catherine.
A—(1) A book-binder or a cardboard box manufacturer will probably supply you with all the materials you require. (2) Have you tried the public libraries and local bookstores? As a rule every public library has a goodly selection of books in several languages. Any bookstore can order these books if not in stock.

Dear Miss Grey—How can I mend on the machine? I was told it could be done, but cannot find out how.—Inexperienced Sewer.
A—Worn places or even holes in woolen materials, linen, including table linen, can sometimes be mended on a lock-stitch machine. The presser-foot is loosened, the place to be mended is put in small circular holes and stretched so that the threads run straight. Then stitch back and forth through the hole until it is filled up.

Dear Miss Grey—It is rude to rest the feet on the dining table.—Know-nothing.
A—The place for the arms and hands is the lap when not actually being used to convey food to the mouth at table. Never put your elbows on a table.

IS A MAN AN AUTOMATON?

The individual, whether it be an animal, a butterfly, or a man, is, according to Prof. Jacques Loeb, a mechanism. As a biologist who has made experiment after experiment, he takes the position that we are all automatons. Man, even though he is a creature of blood, bone and brain, is made up of protoplasmic cells. His acts can all be analyzed into reactions due to the influence of civilization and a complex nervous structure.

When we shake hands we are obedient to the law of action and reaction. Even though we cannot as yet analyze the vastness of the grasp into its chemical elements of a friend, a friend, or a foe, its distance all due to chemical changes taking place in the substance of our being, that is to say in the atoms, molecules and cells that the chemistry of living matter is specifically different from that of the laboratory.

"RANGERS' HOUSES"

To be Built on Many of the Reserves.

In order to protect and administer the Dominion forest reserves to the best advantage, they are being subdivided into ranger districts and houses are being built at strategic points for the use of the rangers in charge. The first of such houses to be occupied on the Duck Mountain forest reserve is located at Mudge Lake, a few miles from Kamsack, Sask.

Mudge Lake is a beautiful, island-studded sheet of water, covering seven square miles, and this ranger-dwelling is picturesquely placed on its south shore. It is a comfortable house, well planned and well lighted, containing living rooms as well as office. It will be painted a dark green with white trimmings.

The trail from this ranger station to Kamsack will next year be widened and otherwise improved. This will benefit the ranger, convenience the public, who have forest business to transact, and induce an increasing number of people to enjoy the many delights of a summer outing at Mudge Lake.

The ranger at this station has direct charge of some two hundred and thirty square miles of highly valuable, young second-growth spruce and poplar forest, and his central object and work will be to safeguard it from fire by every possible means, so that in two or three decades it may yield welcome and abundant supplies of fuel and lumber to the dwellers on the prairies.—Department of the Interior, Forestry Branch.

FEEDING AND GROWTH OF BABES

(By a Physician)

A baby should weigh seven and a half pounds at birth. It should lose from four to eight ounces the first week of its life and gain each week during its first year. During the first six months it should gain from four to eight ounces a week and during the second six months, 17 to 18 pounds. At twelve months, three times its weight at birth. Every week until it is a year old the baby should be weighed and every two weeks when between two and three years old.

If a mother cannot nurse her baby she must look about for some food which is wholesome and nutritious. Of the artificial foods, cow's milk, properly diluted, is the best. But it must be clean, pure and have been kept cold. The best of all milk is that which comes from a healthy cow which is kept under sanitary conditions. Such milk should be consumed before it is twelve hours old. If it cannot be secured, certified milk is next best and then sterilized milk. No mother should feed any milk to her baby which has not been investigated.

Dust, dampness, diphtheria and other germs are the chief causes of sore throat.
