Report County Roads Committee

To Members: Gentlemen,—Your Committee submit herewith report Co. Superintendent. Commenting on report we have to say we are in favor of enlarging bin capacity of quarry in Byng as is being done. We do not approve of buying a gas engine for present at least for this quarry. Arrangements are being made for purchase of quarry at Nelles Corners for W. J. Kinsey. We are not in favor of installing any machinery in this quarry until later on. Recommended that storage building be not proceeded with at present, as we wish to see if a suitable building can be rented for winter. Recommended that Warden and Clerk sign agreement for rental of Dunnville roller. Duplicate copies accompany this report. Recommended that Warden meet Treasurer on a suitable day every two weeks in Cayuga to deal with cheques. 6 spreaders wagons were purchased from Glen Wagon Co. and are good satisfaction, price \$1,300. Submitted—W. D. Roulston, Chairman.

Chairman Co Roads Committee. Dear Sir: For nine weeks elapsed since last meeting Council, July 18. I have progressed as follows: Maintenance generally has been satisfactory though some of the roads are in need of scraping and instruction to do this work have been sent to forman where they have not acted on own responsibility. Would ask committee to consider letting some sections of maintenance by contract. Construction work on Div. 15, Road 7 has progressed steadily but been hampered by wet weather and lack of teams for hauling stone. 3 mile of this road has been completed. First three wagons of train purchased by Committee from Glen Wagon Co. started work immediately after arrival at Hagersville on 14th, second three on 16th. (Gasoline tractor is being tried out on this train as period of demonstration for tractor will not be until 27th, am unable to say whether it will come up to specification on which its purchase is conditional. Arrangements for filling wagons at quarry are satisfactory and road out of quarry is being put in shape by Mr. Hambleton. In addition to one mile completed on Div. 15, practically whole of second mile is graded, ditch through rock cut running west is complete and that through rock cut running east in under way. Construction work on Div. 39, Road 14, has proceeded steadily, but pace is regulated by output of quarry at Byng. Just over 1/2 mile of this road has been completed since last meeting and grading got ready for stone for 1/2 mile further. Portable bin purchased for work on road side and which was temporarily installed in quarry at Byng is construction, timbers are being cut and parts of screen and extension of elevator rendered necessary are on ground. Would recommend purchase for this quarry of a gas engine to drive crusher and a double drum moist, also a portable boiler suitable for supplying steam to drill. Arrangement will enable more than double the number of teams now engaged to haul stone, and will free for other road work, traction engine now in the quarry. For Nelles Corners quarry would recommend that a steam plant be installed and that following equipment be provided for: Steam boiler, steam engine to drive crusher, 25 tons per hour capacity; elevator and screen, 80 yd. run, steam drill. Plans and specifications for frame enclosing covers with galvanized iron are in hand for winter storage of machinery at this quarry. Herewith two copies of agreement with Dunnville for rental of steam roller for ratification by Council. Would ask that other arrangements be made to avoid sending time sheets through three people all in different places before cheques are issued. This method loses time and is an annoyance to the men when not paid regularly. Yours faithfully—A. Mair Jackson, Co. Engineer.

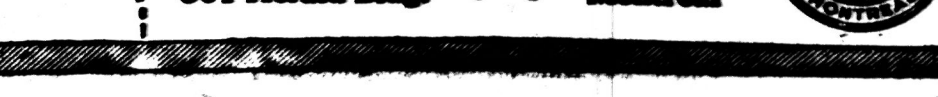
