Jarvis Fall Fair

Celebrates Diamond Jubilee

That the old system of conducting country fairs is gradually being improved, in keeping with the educational idea inaugurated by the directors of exhibitions in the large cities, was one of the outstanding features of the Walpole Agricultural Society held at Jarvis on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week.

The sixtieth annual exhibition of the Walpole Agricultural Society and the big reunion of Walpole's Old Boys and Girls made the Jarvis fair an event that will long be remembered by those in attendance. The weather was all that could be desired, although for many days, even weeks the weather was wet and very disagreeable, but despite these threatening and drawbacks the members and officers of the committee who had charge of the fair never swerved but worked hard to make it a success, and a huge success it proved to be, in point of attendance, exhibits and financially, thus to these energetic men goes the lion's share of the credit. The attendance Wednesday was gratifyingly large, it being estimated that about 2000 people thronged the grounds. The directors and management committee were so enamored with the success of the fair this year that they are already planning to operate the exhibition on a larger scale next year.

That the townspeople and the farmers in the outlying districts manifested great interest in the fair was apparent, as the entries this year were exceedingly large. The eliminating of "fake" shows and other objectionable features, which for years past have characterized many of the country fairs, proved advantageous to the promoters of the exhibition. And they were none missed.

Never in the history of the fair was there a keener competition in the horse ring, an exceptionally fine lot of horses being on the ground. In some classes the individuals could not be beaten in bigger shows. The carriage and roadster horses were there in fair numbers. Most of the entries were good in quality and the classes were fairly well filled.

The cattle and sheep were also fairly well represented by a class of animals that speaks highly of the quality of stock raised in this community. The poultry comprised many excellent birds of merit. The domestic products, roots, vegetables and horticultural exhibits were of a very high order. The flowers were exceedingly well grown for this season.

As is usual at all fairs, the handiwork of the ladies formed a magnificent array. The sewing and fine art display came in for a great deal of congratulatory remarks, some exceptionally fine pieces of embroidery, lace and hand painted work being on exhibition.

The track events were keenly contested the 100-yard dash especially being interesting. The other running events resulted in good time being made and the sport furnished was very enjoyable. The winners and the time made was as follows:

Miss Margaret Allen's readings were beautifully rendered and deservedly applauded. Mr. and Mrs. Harry McDonald of Toronto were the chief entertainers and proved themselves equal to the occasion. Mrs. McDonald in song captured the audience with her singing and pleasing personality, while Mr. McDonald, as a comedian, fairly brought down the house with his funny selections, being repeatedly encores. Main Provisions of "The Ontario Stallion Act" and Regulations

- (1) That each Stallion standing for service in Ontario must be enrolled with the Stallion Enrolment Board.
- (2) A certificate of each enrolment will be issued by the Board, which certificate must form a part of each newspaper advertisement or poster advertising the Stallion.
- (3) As the option of the owner the Stallion may be inspected by other officers appointed under the Act, and if such inspection is made, the report of the inspection will form a part of the record of enrolment and the Registration Certificate will be issued in accordance therewith.
- (4) The Board will fix the things and places at which Stallions may be inspected; notice thereof will be given so that any person desiring to procure the inspection of a Stallion may present him at the most convenient point.
- (5) For the purposes of the administration of the Act, a Pure Bred Stallion is considered to be one registered in one of the Records affiliated with the Canadian National Live Stock Records or in case there is no such Record for the breed, in one of the records recognized as authentic by the Record Board. A grade Stallion is considered to be any other Stallion.
- (6) Following are considered diseases, or malformations, as the cases may be, Bone Spavin; curb, when associated with a formation of hook which predisposes to curb; bog spavin, when associated with a formation of hook which predisposes to bog spavin; string-halt; side-bone; roaring or whistling; periodic ophthalmia; and navicular disease.
- (7) Six forms of certificate will be issued to provide for the following conditions:
 - (a) Pure Bred, inspected and approved
 - (b) Pure Bred, inspected, but found to be not free from malformations and diseases named in the Regulations.
 - (c) Pure Bred, not inspected.
 - (d) Grade, inspected and found to be free from Malformations and diseases named in the Regulations.
 - (e) Grade, inspected, but found to be not free from Malformations and diseases named in the Regulations.
 - (f) Grade, not inspected.
- (8) Each enrolment must be renewed annually. In case of inspected Stallions, however, the report of the Inspection Committee will hold good for two years.
- (9) When a Stallion is sold, the transfer must be registered with the Board.
- (10) The fees to be paid to the Board before the issue of any certificate shall be:

For enrolment \$2.00
For inspection 5.00
For renewal of enrolment 1.00
For transfer certificate 1.00
- (11) The penalty for contravention of any of the provisions of the act will be not more than \$1.00 nor less than \$25.00.
- (12) The act does not apply to the Provisional Judicial Districts nor the Provisional County of Haldimand.

We could depend upon the Western Canadian farmer to bring them to reason and in the bracing air of the prairies they would speedily abandon all idea of starving themselves for the good of the cause.
