

In 1896 Mecca became infected, also the Transvasi, South Africa. Later, during the same year, it was found among the deck laborers of Oporto, Portugal. In 1890 the disease obtained a footing on the western coast of the two Americas, To-day, says the Journal of the American Medical Association, we admit its presence in South America and are not sure that it is not present on the Pacific coast of

it is not present on the Pacific coast of the United States. The present epidemic is similar to those of the past in that the disease has advanced along the highways of commerce, save that its present distribution has been principally by sea routes, in contradistinction to the overland routes of former ages.

WATER SKATES.

On the Lake of Gross-Wusterwitz, in

the Prussion province of Saxony, water skaters moving with surprising agility have now made their appearance in great numbers. They use a novel type of non-rigid water skate constructed by the Deutsche-Wasserlaufschuh-Werke, which may be said to eliminate all the drawbacks so far inherent in this mode of locomotion. These compressed air of water-skates which embody the results of many years' studies and indefatigable experimenting, look very much like skis, have strikingly low weight and small dimensions, and accordingly allow the skater to glide on the water with an extreme case. While in ordinary rowing one has to turn his back to the direction of motion, water skating has the additional advantage of allowing the face to be turned forward so that the eve on account of the erect position can sweep freely over a wide expanse of water. A further advantage of the new water-skates, which on account of their low weight are readily transportable, is the possibility of folding them up into a small and extremely handy bundle, after allowing the compressed air to escape from the floats consisting of pointed caoutchouc cylinders and rubber-coated sail-cloth covers.) They are pumped up again and mounted for use with the same rapidity

At the underside of the water-skates are attached movable fins which hy opening at every move, enable the skater to slide on with the utmost facility Another possibility which affords additional variety is to use alternately or simultaneously with the work of the legs, a light paddle endowing the scater with a mobility attained by no water craft. Everywhere, even on the most frequented waters, will the skater be able swiftly to make his way through the crowd of ships and boats.

Water-skating in this new form seems to be anything but a dangerous sport, The feeling of absolute safety which is experienced by the users of water-skates is based in their very construction. The keel running underenath the waterskate (and tied up to the latter) insures a very sufficient stability, excluding any risk of tumbling. In fact, no fall or other accident has so far occurred on any one of the numerous trips made on water-skates nor in connection with the exercises of beginners even in rough water. However, provision has been made even for the remot possibility of an acswimming, the skater is, in fact, able the water-skates. The only back motion of the locking lever required in this con nection is effected without difficulty and with an absolute safety in any posi tion whatever. A saftev device prevents any involuntary detachment. - Scientific American.


