THE JARVIS RECORD A Long Forgotten Anniversary

First Upper Canada Assembly

Constitutional Government in Canada
—A Conscientious Quaker Elected—
—Incidents of Early Meeting at
Historic Niagara.

Just let us think of it—Since the month of September, 1792, there has been an interval of 120 years. In 1792 George III. was King of Great Britain. In 1792 George III. was King of Great Britain; in fact had been King many years before and quite a few years after. What ever opinion we may form or that sturdy old Hanoverian, we cannot by any possibility deny the fact that he appeared on the stage of history at an epoch-making period. From the previous reign he inherited the "Seven Years' War" and some other things that he could just as well have done without; yet he came to the throne in what might be called a blaze of glory for had not Wolfe defeated Montcalm and wrested from France the old Key Fortress of Quebec. But the reign of George III. was destined to be memorable on the North American Continent, for more reasons than one. Historians have not getting into a better perspective, and the events of that reign, or many of them, are beginning to undergo historic revisions—notably in many of the circumstances connected with, and leading up to, what is usually termed the American Revolution. This was perhaps inevitable for we are not living in a world of perpetuities. Just 120 years ago such places as Niagara-on-the-Lake, sometimes called Lenox, Queenston and Chippawa were of very much greater importance than Shipman's Corners and many other places that had hardly an existence. Paul Shipman, who founded this good city, built better than he knew, and if these frontier towns have been swept and obliterated by such places as Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo, the cause does not lie within the purview of this article. Well, as we were about to say—just 120 years ago to-day, the House of Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada met for the first time for the despatch of business. Thank to the indefatigable efforts of that tireless and hard almost as Prime Minister, the Archivist—Dr. Alexander Fraser, we now have access to the proceedings of that never-to-be forgotten Assembly. The members were comparatively few and we are only concerned with those who had the distinguished honor of representing the Lincoln.

The first Lincoln was named to Norfolk and the first representative was Parshall Terry. For Prince Edward and Adolphus, one Philip Dorland was elected, but which we will refer later. All the members were present at the opening session, and as usual, the first duty performed was the election of a Speaker, and an unanimous choice was made in John Macdonell, Esq., Member for the County of Glengarry. From this fact alone it is easy to see how early that famous clan Macdonnell assumed a leading position in the affairs of this country, and no one will venture to deny that alike in Church and State, they have carved their names deep in Canadian history.

"I have mentioned you," said His Excellency the Governor, addressing the members of the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly. "Under authority of an act of Parliament of Great Britain passed in the last year, which has established the British constitution and all the forms which secure and maintain it in this distant country.

"The wisdom and beneficence of Our Most Gracious Sovereign and the British Parliament have been eminently proved, not only by imparting to us the same form of Government but in securing benefit by many provisions, which guard this memorable act so that the blessings of our invaluable constitution thus protected and amplified, we hope will be extended to remote and distant posterity.

"The great and momentous Trusts and duties which have been committed to the representatives of this Province, in a degree infinitely beyond whatever, till this period, have distinguished any other colony, have originated from the British nation upon a just consideration of the energy and hazard with which the inhabitants have so consistently supported and defended the British Constitution.

"It is from the same patriotism now called upon to exercise with due deliberation and foresight, the various offices of civil administration, that your fellow subject of the British Empire expect the foundation of Union of Industry and Wealth, of Commerce and Power, which may lead through all succeeding ages.

"The natural advantages of the Province of Upper Canada are inferior to none on this side of the Atlantic; there can be no separate interest through its whole extent; the British form of Government has prepared the way for its speedy colonization, and I trust that your fostering care will improve the favorable situation, that a numerous and agricultural people will speedily take possession of a soil and climate which, under the British Laws and munificence with which His Majesty has granted the lands of the Crown, offer such manifest and peculiar encouragements."

The usual Parliamentary routine of the speaker's reception and reply to the address having been gone through, the morning adjourned until 10 o'clock the next morning, clearly showing that they were business men who believed in transacting practical business in day light. After prayers on the morning of the 18th by Dr. Addison, the case of Philip Dorland came up for consideration on that gentleman's petition which set forth:

"That I, the said Philip Dorland, having been elected a member of the Legislative Council of the Province of Upper Canada, and having been permitted to sit or vote therein, until he has taken and subscribed a certain oath therein set forth. And whereas from the religious principles which I profess (being one of persons commonly called Quakers) I do not feel myself at liberty nor can I conscientiously take an oath in the form and manner usually prescribed, although I would readily affirm and subscribe a declaration to the purpose and effect therein set forth, and whereas I have reason to believe that in consequence of such my scruples and refusal to comply with the form therein directed, I should not be permitted to sit or vote in the said House of Assembly, I the said Philip Dorland have, in the presence of the Returning Officer, signed, sealed and executed these present and declared and have requested the said Returning Officer to annex the

Sunday School Convention

The Haldimand County Sunday School Convention was held in Knox Church, Hagersville on Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 16th, 17th. The attendance was not very large. The first session was opened on Monday evening by Rev. W. A. Dolson, the first speaker being Rev. G. L. Lowes; subject, "The relation of the S. S. to sports and physical culture," which was very interesting and instructive, showing that the Sunday Schools should do something to help the boys, its leaders should be with them, ready to give a helping hand. Sole by Miss Nina Blackman, next speaker, Rev. W. E. Halpeny, took as his subject, "A higher rating for our school." He brought out three thoughts: first, Trained Leadership; second, an aroused church and parentage; third, the family and the church. The idea of the S. S. in the 19th century was to teach the Bible, the 20th century was to teach the child. Tuesday morning session was opened by Rev. R. J. Elliott. First speaker was Rev. W. E. Halpeny, subject; "The Sunken Road." In this address he referred to the work of the Y.M.C.A. and their triangle motto—the Body, Mind and Spirit. The S.S. must take a keener interest in the boys and girls. The next speaker was Rev. Wm. H. Raibby, who spoke on training the scholars for active church work; in our teaching we must give them something to do, let them do some of the questioning. Afternoon session opened by Mr. J. H. Rowe. Rev. W. E. Halpeny again spoke, this time on "Courtesy." He opened by saying a good debate could be carried out on this thought, "Resolved that morality in childhood is the product of what they come in contact with at home." Rev. F. J. Fydel spoke on "Opening windows the Workers' Task." It is the work of the teachers and officers of the S.S. to open up the soul of every boy and girl that the sunshine of Christ's love may flood in and drive out sin.
