

A condition is never so bad but what it might be worse. The forty-day rain in Ontario has caused no little concern among farmers as to the outcome of the harvest. Many have given up hope of saving the grain crop in even passably good condition. Farmers who have their wheat in stock, as not a few have are contronted with sprouted grain, and a yield that will be of little use other than for feed. The oat crop, too, which promised to be a good one, is also seriously injured, and the outlook generally, so far as Ontario's grain harvest is concerned, is not the brightest. But there is a bright side to the situation after all. Not for many years have pastures looked so well at this time of the year as this season. There is good succulent food in abund ance for stock in most places, and the fall should be a very successful one on the feed score. The after grass from meadows and grain fields, seeded in the spring is most luxuriant. The second crop of clover was never better than this This will mean increased feed supply or bigger yields of clover seed if it come to maturity. On the whole there-fore, the outlook for the Ontario farmer is not all dark and gloomy. At this dis-tance it looks as if the farmer will begin the winter with his supply of fodder and feed of all kinds larger than it has been for some years back. Of course it will be some time yet before the yield of corn and roots can be estimated with exactness. Just now these crops gives promise of a good yield in most places. Ontario is a stockman's country more than it is a grain country, and if the feed bin is full to overflowing the farmer's position is not altogether one to be pitied.
