All the light and power carried over these wires were for the towns and cities, and the farmer was not considered at all. Now, however, an effort is to be made to supply light and power for the farms in localities where a certain number of farmers unite to take a supply. This is some slight advance over the former spirit of indifference to the farmers' needs. But this small concession must be inscribed if it does not find a plan whereby at a very moderate figure the farmer can hook a wire to the great trunk wires and so get power and light such as he requires in that way.
