Council met pursuant to adjournment on 22 March, 1913, at the Council Chamber, Jarvis. All members were present, Reeve J. J. Parsons in the chair. The Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

D. 66, \$1.00; Gravel, Div. 56 (1912), 2.80; G. T. & Co., 10 per cent cost Jarvis Gate Dec. 1912, 3.88; W. D. Roulston, expenses to Good Road Convention, 10.00; David McBurney, do., 10.00.

Falls—Clark, resolved that a bridge be built on 5th Concession across Sanduski creek and that Messrs. Parsons and McBurney be a committee to have the work done.—Carried.

Roulston—McBurney, resolved that this Council purchase 400 yds. crushed stone to be used in improving 13th Con. and that the Reeve and W. G. Clark be a committee to have the work done.—Carried.

Roulston—Clark, resolved, that we purchase 2000 ft. oak plank at \$35.00 per M from Jepson Bros.—Carried.

Roulston—McBurney, resolved that we order six Road Drags from the Sarnia Bridge Co. to be delivered at Jarvis and the Reeve look after the same. The price of Drags to be \$13.50 each, F. O. B. Jarvis.—Carried.

Roulston—McBurney, resolved that leave be granted to introduce a Bill to appoint Robert George Kyd Township Engineer and the same be now read a first time.—Carried.

The Bill was given a 2nd and 3rd reading and passed, signed, numbered and entitled a by-law as the original motion.—Carried. Clark—McBurney, resolved that leave be granted to introduce a bill to appoint Dr. Jacques Medical Health Officer for the Township of Walpole and for his salary.—Carried.

The bill was given a second and third reading, passed, signed, numbered and entitled as in the original motion.—Carried.

Clark—McBurney, resolved that leave be granted to introduce a bill to appoint overseers of Highways in the Township of Walpole for the next ensuing year and that the same be read a first time.—Carried.

The bill was given a 2nd and 3rd reading, passed, signed, numbered and entitled a by-law as in the original motion.—Carried.

### Rockford

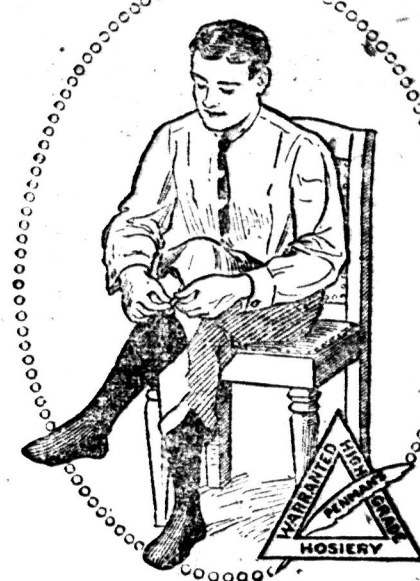
