Pending this consummation, however he suggests that the range in the date of Easter might be reduced to a week; viz., from April 5th to April 11th.

## Obituary

Another of Walpole's worthy pioneers has passed away in the person of Walter Cutler Parsons who died on Saturday, April 26th in his eighty-seventh year. Mr. Parsons was born at Grimsby, June 18, 1826 and came to the Jarvis community when nineteen years of age, the toll-gate and Mr. Shannon's house being at that time the only buildings in existence at Jarvis. For forty-eight years he lived on the homestead where he finally passed peacefully away after bravely contending with a number of attacks of pneumonia with characteristic cheerfulness, trust and resignation. A kind neighbor, a true friend, a worthy citizen, and affectionate parent and grandparent, the deceased will, in his influence for good, birthday of the bride, Mr. Parsons married Mary Ann Henning. Their golden wedding in 1900 and Diamond Jubilee in 1910, were celebrated with joy and thanksgiving for the blessings of their happy married life. Three of the six sons survive: Walter M. of Lakeside, Mich., John J. (Warden of Haldimand) at home and Lewis N. of Windsor, Ont.

The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Tuesday, April 29, interment taking place in the cemetery of the Methodist Church, the services in the home, at the grave and in the church being conducted by the pastor, Rev. Arthur Clare Eddy. The following acted as pallbearers: John Thompson, John Curwene, Thomas Curwene, Thomas Murphy, Silas Synder and Robert McIntosh.

## Hicks' May Forecasts

With a regular storm period central on 4th, and extending from the 2nd to the 7th, except all the results due under such astronomical conditions. The Moon is on the celestial equator on the 6th. It will grow suddenly very warm on and about the 2nd, the barometer will fall to low readings, and a series of threatening thunder storms will set in, passing from west to east over the country. The 4th, 5th and 6th will be the dates of greatest storm culminations, although the 2nd calls for active thunder and lightning. Change to clearing and cooler weather will follow in the immediate wake of the storms, spreading eastwardly over the country and lasting for several days. From the 6th to the 9th is a seismic period, alling for a return of earthquake shocks in various parts of the globe. The 6th is the central day of the period.

Vacant houses are at the present time scarce in town and several people who intended moving to Jarvis were compelled to abandon the idea. Building does not appear to keep pace with the growth of population.
