A letter received by Mr. Gardiner, Principal of the Untario School of the Ontario School for the Ontario School for the Blind. from the Superintendent of the American Musion School for the blind at Bombay, India, mentions that the estinated number of blind people in India 500,000, of whom certainly not more than 500 have had any opportunity for an education or training alone industrial lines. Reports from many places in the United Seates, as well as from sevaral European countries, indicate that blindness is decreasing in the most highly civilized communities, largely as the result of greater knowledge, and more attention to preventive measures, on the part of physicians and nurses. While the returns of the last Dominion census on this subject have not been tabulated and pubished, there is reason to believe that a similar statement is applicable to Canada Neverthlesa it is probable that there are now-as there always have been-many young people in Ontario who ought to be enrolled as pupils in the School at Brantford, but are not.
