## MONORAILS IN IRELAND.

Green Isle is Scene of a Momentous Traction Test.

Many attempts have been made to devise a car that would run on one rail, but none of the so-called "monorail" systems have amounted to much. Instead of having one rail they really have three—two extra ones below the main carrier to keep the cars from toppling over.

The only genuine monorail roads tested extensively are those where the cars are kept on the rail by means of a gyroscope or where the cars were suspended by a kind of trolley arrangement.

Neither system has been a success because the small saving effected in constructing the line is more than outweighed by the inconveniences of the "one rail" system.

Ireland is now offering to the world, however, a contribution in the form of a monorail road of an odd design. This road seems almost absurd, yet it may be the germ of great improvements. The first electric railway in the world was operated at the Giant's Causeway in the northeast of Ireland, and though every one scoffed at that attempt and said that electricity would never have the strength to pull loaded cars we now see electric cars all over the world.

Where the broad mouth of the river Shannon mingles its waters with the ocean, where the stern west coast of Ireland thrusts its promontories toward America, stands Ballybunion. About a mile and a half farther north stands Belmore, and between these two small towns extends that quaint little road, the Ballybunion monorail.

On its single track, raised on a trestle and in its curious cars passengers and freight are carried from Ballybunion and Belmore and back again in the remarkable time of five minutes.

The monorail on which its strange locomotive and trains run is about three feet high, while the distance between the lower rails, which serve to maintain the equilibrium of the rolling stock, is about two feet.

Most remarkable of its equipment is the locomotive, with its queer elliptical boiler and firebox. It has one cylinder on each side, the rods of which are inside connected to the drivers.

The interior of a passenger car is divided into two longitudinal compartments, which are entered by separate doors. Freight and stock cars are similarly divided.

To enable pedestrians and wagons to cross the tracks of the Ballybunion railroad small lift bridges are constructed at the various roads and remain in a lowered position for the accommodation of traffic.

When it is necessary for a train to pass such a point the crossing flagman raises the bridge, thus permitting the train to proceed. The Ballybunion road hauls considerable freight for so short a road.

### Very Small Writing.

Mr. Kenneth Muir of Gorton, Manchester, Eng., claims to have produced the finest examples of minute writing in the world, and the feat which he has accomplished will certainly take a lot of beating. In 1899 he wrote in open competition the Lord's Prayer nineteen times and a few words over, within the space covered by a threepenny-bit, every letter being distinct. He ultimately improved on this effort by writing the Lord's Prayer twenty-three times and forty-nine words over, all within the space covered by a three-penny bit, this being his record attempt.

Equally remarkable was his feat of writing the word "Easter," with a capital "E," 37,464 times on the back of an ordinary postcard, the time occupied being twenty-one days. This feat was performed in connection with a competition promoted by a Mr. Pain at Folkestone, Mr. Muir winning the prize by some 21,000 words.

### Pay For Church Work.

In The Barking Parish Magazine, an English church publication, appeared the following:

"Wanted—Half a dozen young churchmen to take up a useful branch of church work—namely, the science and art of campanology. Vacancies have occurred in the St. Margaret's Society of Change Ringers. Qualifications necessary: Earnestness, enthusiasm and energy. Preference will be given to those who are prepared to take up ringing seriously and to give the greater part of their (spare) time to a study which is more brainy than billiards, more captivating than cricket, more fascinating than football and more pleasurable than the 'pictures.' Remuneration: More kicks than ha'pence."

### Auction by Candle.

A quaint custom, over 200 years old, known as the "Candle Auction," for the letting of a field called Stowell Meadow, situated at Tatworth, near Chard, Somerset, Eng., was again observed. The tenants on the estate, of which Stowell Meadow forms part, met at the village inn, and during the burning of an inch of tallow candle made bids for renting ground for a year. Certain fines are imposed which are put into a "kitty," and afterwards spent upon refreshments for the company.

### Burns Got Out of It.

Occasionally Mr. John Burns's great fluency lets him down. It did in the British House of Commons recently, when he was talking with pathos about "poor orphans and their widowed mothers who turn charwomen." "There they are," he cried, "working, cleaning out our public offices, making a noble struggle to keep a sick husband"—a titter that grew rapidly to a roar of laughter informed him that he had gone wrong—"to keep a home together," he corrected, hastily.

### Leprosy.
