From half cent per mile from all points east of MacLeod, Calgary or Edmonton to Winnipeg.

GOING DATES

- AUGUST 18th — From all stations Kingston to Renfrew inclusive and east thereof in Ontario.
- AUGUST 22nd — From Toronto and West on Grand Trunk Main Line to Sarnia inclusive and South thereof.
- AUGUST 25th — From Toronto and North-Western Ontario, North of but not including Grand Trunk Line Toronto to Sarnia and East of Toronto to Kingston, Sarnia Lake and Renfrew, including these points.
- SEPTEMBER 3rd — From Toronto and all stations in Ontario East of but not including Grand Trunk Line Toronto to North Bay.
- SEPTEMBER 5th — From all stations on Grand Trunk Line Toronto to North Bay inclusive, and West thereof in Ontario, including C.P.R. Line Sudbury to Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, but not including Astoria and West.

One-way second class tickets to Winnipeg only will be sold. Each ticket will include a verification certificate, with an extension coupon. When extension coupon has been signed at Winnipeg by a farmer, showing he has engaged to work as a farm laborer, the coupon will be honored up to September 30th for ticket at rate of one-half cent per mile (minimum fifty cents) to any station west of Winnipeg on the Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern or Grand Trunk Pacific Railways in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, but not west of Edmonton, Calgary or MacLeod, Alta.

Dr. Nichol Honored By Young People's Guild

On the occasion of his leaving Edmonton the members of the Young People's Guild of First Presbyterian Church last night tendered a farewell social to Rev. J. L. Nichol, M. A., Ph. D., the popular assistant pastor of the church. The large attendance of members and friends was a striking evidence of his popularity, the lecture room of the church being crowded. Prior to the social the company was photographed in front of the church. On adjournment to the hall the chair was occupied by Mr. C. S. Parker, president of the society, who in his opening

speech, expressed his pleasure at seeing such a large number present to bid farewell to Dr. Nichol. A splendid musical program was then enjoyed, the following artists taking part, Miss S. McCrimmon, A. McDonald, Ella Taylor, Helen Hughes and Mr. J. Holmes. At the conclusion of the social program Mr. C. S. Parker in the name of the society made the presentation of a handsome club bag, purse of gold and an illuminated address to Dr. Nichol, the text of the address being as follows: Address to Rev. John Lennox Nichol, M. A., Ph. D., assistant pastor First Presbyterian Church, Edmonton, Alta. "When it was made known that you were about to leave Edmonton, we, the mem-

bers of the First Presbyterian Young People's Guild felt that we could not let the occasion pass, without placing on record, and expressing in a tangible manner our deep regret at your departure and our warm appreciation of your valued services to the Guild. Since coming to Edmonton you have taken a deep interest in the work of the Young People's Guild, and it has been your good fortune to see it develop into a highly flourishing organization, and we feel that not a little of this success is due directly to your energies. Improvement of Welland Canal

The Welland Canal, connecting the St. Lawrence with the Great Lakes, is undergoing improvements of such magnitude that they will total about \$2,000,000 per mile. The canal, which is 25 miles in length, traverses a lofty divide over which it is necessary to raise vessels to a total vertical height of 325 feet. The new work of improvement, taken in connection with the deepening and widening of the St. Lawrence channel will have a most important effect on the problems of movement of freight from the Northwest to the Atlantic seaboard.
