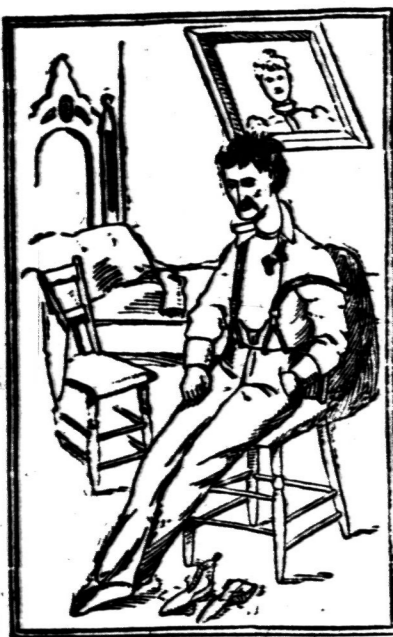

A MINISTER'S SALARY.

Lloyd George Tells What Expenses of His "Magnificent" Income.

Mr. Lloyd George gave some interesting particulars regarding his financial standing in giving evidence before the Marconi committee a few days ago.

"When a man becomes a Minister," he said, "he is given a substantial salary, and it was very substantial to me, having regard to the life I led at that time as a solicitor. It was very substantial, and I won't deny it. The only thing I wish to say about it is that it was not larger than that received by my predecessor, as there is a suggestion that I am the first Chancellor to receive £5,000 a year.

"Every Minister knows his position is precarious and his glories transitory, and he has to take that into account and must think of the time when others, more worthy than himself, will fill the same position. As we know by history, parties come and parties go. Ministers have to change, and he must look to the fact that any day he may drop. With regard to that, I, therefore, had to consider what every Minister has to consider in my position—not to live quite up to your income, but to set something aside, and I have done it. I have invested.

"My total investments bring me about £400 a year. That is my great fortune. With regard to mansions, I have only one house which I can call my own. I have one house in Wales. Cannot a man fifty years of age have one house to call his own? It is rather hard. I built a house three or four years ago. I was so busy with the budget I could not even spend my salary. The contract, I think, was something over £2,000. That is my mansion. That is all I have got in the world."

Mr. Lloyd George might have summed up his plea that a Cabinet Minister should not be traduced because, out of his salary, he seeks to make provision by investment for the future, in the words of Burke: "If a Minister sees that the state takes no detriment, the state must see that his affairs should take as little." In those words the whole position of the Minister without large private means is summed up by one of the purest of politicians, and the sentence was quoted with great earnestness by Peel before the Committee of the House which, in 1850, was considering whether official salaries should be reduced. In point of fact, many of our most prominent politicians have been poor men.

Of Chancellors of the Exchequer there are Pitt, Canning, Lord John Russell, Vansittart, Spring Rice, North, and Lord Randolph Churchill. Chatham's private income when he entered politics was £100 a year. Vansittart was glad to accept a special pension of £3,000 a year when he was "kicked upstairs." Burke was always a poor man. North had to accept £20,000 from the King to pay his most crushing debts. Perceval eked out his salary as Chancellor with that of a second office. Fox had a good deal less than nothing. Spring Rice was provided for by a sinecure.

Titled Lady Churchwardens.

It is not often that one finds a woman acting as churchwarden, but Viscountess Gage, who has been nominated to that position at Firle, in Sussex, England, is not the first by any means. Perhaps the best-known instance at present is afforded by Isabella Marchioness of Exeter, the mother of the present marquis. Last year she was elected, for the fourteenth year in succession, as people's warden at Deeping St. James's, a village in Lincolnshire, where the living is in her gift.

Similarly, in the Free Churches women are sometimes, though not frequently, elected to offices that are more or less analogous. Among the Congregationalists, says The Westminster Gazette, Lady Spicer holds a unique position. She appears to be the only woman member of the existing Council of the Congregational Union, being one of the thirty representatives of the London Union. At the opening, some weeks ago, of a new Congregational church in North-west London, Lady Spicer made a plea for more use to be made of members of her sex in the government of the churches.

MEN! The Virtue of Cold Drinks

Time was when the consumption of ice-water in the heat of summer was regarded as positively suicidal. Europeans made grave predictions that the custom would bring about degeneration of the digestive powers of the people of this continent leaving the race chronic dyspeptics. These prophecies however, have not altogether been fulfilled; and instead of the European countries being gripped by the cold drink habit, Physicians now say that cold drinks are especially used drinks, are not harmful in themselves, but on the contrary, wholesome, and that anything that cools the system during extreme heat, is likely to do good rather than harm. Instantly, after all, a better guide than prejudice. Even the use of ice cream at the conclusion of a meal is now regarded as a help, rather than a hindrance to digestion. In cooling off the stomach, temporarily, the doctors have discovered that the reaction that follows immediately brings more blood to that organ and a nervous tone to the mucous membrane and its glands, that causes them to digest better.

Another pronounced change of opinion has come with regard to the taking of fluids. Most of us remember being being taught in school physiology, and at home, that fluids, when taken at meal time, diluted the gastric juice and, hampered digestion as a consequence. It is now generally admitted, however, that fluids taken at meal time do not disturb digestion, and that the so-called dilution of the gastric juice is a theoretic supposition, not confirmed by investigation. It is even said that those who drink a great deal at meals, digest with less discomfort, absorb with more ease, and get much more nutrition out of their food, than those who take a more or less dry diet. Instinct and natural craving, have once more proved to be correct. Not so many years ago the poor fever patient had to go thirsty or take sickish warm fluids. Now at a temperature ranging from 103 to 105 degrees, patients are plunged directly into an ice bath.
