Joint Prison Farm.

Oxford, Waterloo, Norfolk and Brant to Unite.

A despatch from Woodstock says representatives from Oxford, Norfolk, Waterloo and Brant, which counties are interested in the proposed joint prison farm project, a report was read from Dr. Bruce Smith recommending the purchase of land and the erection of buildings to cost about \$5000. This cost with about \$50,000, and the counties will total \$10,000 each if Elgin and North Perth that they will. The four counties will be asked to appoint commissioners who will form the board of management for the commission. The committee was instructed to inspect several of the sites reported on to-day, notably one near Lakeside and another near the communication with Brant.
