Eighteen out of 24 Illinois towns became dry in the voting recently. "The women did it," is the cry. 80 per cent of them voted in favor of abolition of the saloon. Thirty-one out of 102 counties in the state are now completely dry.

We are told by the New York papers that already foreign eggs to the number of over half a million have reached that city to be imported free of duty, and that 2,000,000 more eggs from "effete Europe" are on the way. But we may point out that if any Canadian importer should seek to import any of these foreign eggs into Canada for the use of the Canadian people, he would have to pay 3 cents per dozen duty for the privilege. Is that the way to lessen the high cost of living?

news the same way the millman gets his mill—by pumping. This is true especially of that class of items known as "personals." Rightly, they are not "personals" or "affairs," but simple personal mention, given for the benefit of the local readers, and if you have a friend or relative visiting you, let us know and we will be glad to give the item proper notice. Put any bit of news worth printing in the way of our pencil pusher.

Dr. Robert Watterson of Darlington, a few days ago was called to the home of Peter Young. Shortly after leaving, the physician found that his pocket-book containing \$37.32 was missing. He concluded he must have dropped it along the public road, and that it was gone forever. Later a calf belonging to Young became ill, and it died. As the sickness of the calf was peculiar, the farmer made a postmortem examination. In the stomach of the animal he found the missing pocketbook with the contents intact. The metal clasp of the pocketbook had opened and cut through the calf's stomach causing death. Young took the pocket-book and money to Dr. Watterson, and the latter refused to take it, saying, "Keep the money to reimburse you for the loss of your calf."

Tuberculosis Day

The schools are taking up the work of instruction on tuberculosis and its preventives. The principals of the various schools in the province are expected to give short addresses along this line. This arrangement is in accordance with a suggestion thrown out to the various Boards of Education by the Minister of Education, Hon. Dr. Pyne.

CHRISTMAS APPEAL

FOR THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN
COLLEGE ST., TORONTO

Dear Mr. Editor:—

Thanks for your kindness in allowing me the privilege of appealing at this Christmas time on behalf of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto.

It would take more space than you can spare to tell of the good work done for the sick and deformed children of this Province. Let me, however, in a few words, tell you of the progress of the work of the Hospital.

One nurse, six little white beds, a few dollars, a few friends—this was the beginning. The beds have grown to 250, the dollars to thousands, the friends to hundreds. 1915, the first year, 44 inpatients, 67 outpatients; 1916, last year, 1,648 inpatients, 25,597 outpatients; 1917, 1 nurse; 1918, 70 nurses.

Since 1915, thirty-eight years ago, the Hospital has admitted within its walls 23,618 children, as inpatients, and 159,231 as outpatients, a total of 182,849, or an average of 4,783 per year. Of the 23,618 inpatients, 16,200 were from Toronto, and 5,418 from other parts of the Province; 10,150 of the total inpatients were cured, and 6,267 were improved.

In the Orthopedic Department last year, of the 1,648 inpatients, 576 were treated for deformities, 25 hip diseases, 37 Pott's disease, 2 knock-knees, 19 bow-legs, 62 club feet, 3 lateral curvature of the spine, 44 infantile paralysis, 6 wry neck, and 75 tubercular disease of knee, hip and ankle. In 1913, the Surgical Apparatus Shop manufactured 427 appliances for inpatients and outpatients, including ankle braces, spinal braces, hip splints, bow-leg splints, club-foot splints, plaster jackets, etc. Half of these came from places outside of Toronto. Surely we have a fair claim for help from the people of this Province.

Will you, the reader of this letter, help to give crippled children a fair start in life? Busy dollars are better than idle tears. The sympathy that helps is good, but the Hospital has to have the sympathy that works.

While Christmas Bells are ringing to the glory of Him "Who made the lame to walk and the blind to see," give, give, give, and help the Hospital to help God's little ones, upon whom the heavy hand of affliction has been laid.
