### Dead Instead of Getting Married.

#### Strange Fate of Woman Who Answered Matrimonial Advertisement.

The death occurred very unex-  
pectedly on Monday in a house she  
had occupied a few days on Brock  
street, says the Tillsonburg Obser-  
ver, of a woman supposed to be Mrs  
Harriet Carr, formerly of Port Jer-  
vis, New York.

It is said Mrs. Carr came to the  
vicinity of Tillsonburg about two  
months ago, with the intention of  
marrying a Houghton farmer with  
whom she had been in communi-  
cation through a matrimonial adver-  
tisement. After arriving, she de-  
clared she had been deceived, facts  
having been misrepresented to her,  
and she decided not to marry the  
man, although a license had been  
procured.

About two weeks ago the woman  
came to Tillsonburg and another  
suitor appeared and a marriage is  
said to have been arranged between  
them and was to have taken place  
in a few days. The woman rented  
a house on Brock street, where she  
became ill and died.

Deceased was a fine looking wo-  
man of about sixty-five years of age  
and was well dressed. She told  
several persons that she had prop-  
erty, and was drawing a pension.  
It is also said that she carried life  
insurance policies.

She got into communication  
with the Baptist pastor of this town,  
and stated that she was a member of  
the Baptist church. She had every  
appearance of being a respectable  
woman and letters from relatives  
found in her belongings would bear  
this out.

The cause of death was given as  
acute indigestion by the attending  
physician. The interment took  
place at the town cemetery.

It appears that Australia, so long

began to attack the sheep, and now  
it is proposed to exterminate the  
dogs. Apparently, as Literary Di-  
gest notes, "there is to be no end  
to this endless game of The House  
that Jack Built."

### A Startling Contrast.

For One Man 10 Years in Prison  
and Twenty Lashes—For An-  
other a Fine of \$10.00.

The Reformer has often argued  
that one of the weakest points about  
the administration of justice in Can-  
ada is the horrible disparity in the  
sentences imposed by different jus-  
tices upon men convicted of similar  
offences.

Never has this been brought to  
public attention here more vividly  
than by two sentences handed down  
in Norfolk within a short period.  
A couple of months ago Judge Kel-  
ly gave Jack Underhill of Walsing-  
ham ten years in Kingston Peniten-  
tiary and twenty lashes, on being  
convicted of an attempt to commit  
an indecent assault upon a young  
girl. Last week, Squire Beemer,  
police magistrate of Simcoe, tried  
George Barber of Townsend on a  
charge of having carnal knowledge  
of a girl named Thompson, also of  
Townsend, not fourteen years of  
age. He found Barber guilty of an  
indecent assault and sentenced him  
to pay a fine of ten dollars and  
costs.

The Reformer does not wish to be  
understood as defending the senten-  
ce imposed on young Underhill.  
It was the severest sentence impos-  
ed in Norfolk in a generation, the  
character of the offence being con-  
sidered. But even if Underhill's  
sentence be looked upon as overly  
severe, surely a \$10 fine is a travesty  
on justice. If Squire Beemer be-  
lieved Barber's story, he should  
have discharged him; if he consid-  
ered him guilty, he said he did  
the imposition of any fine is not a  
commensurate punishment. A fine  
of ten dollars is a mockery. The  
case should certainly be brought  
to the attention of the Attorney-  
General.—Simcoe Reformer.

Mr. W. S. Caron, collector of cus-  
toms at Aylmer, died on Monday of  
last week of typhoid fever after an  
illness of six weeks' duration. He  
was one of the best known and es-  
teemed residents of East Elgin.

He will be succeeded as collector  
of customs by Mr. J. G. Hector,

business in Aylmer.
