Too Many Orphans Now.

Recently The Renfrew Journal pointed out that any increase of the number of children brought out from the orphanages of Great Britain was undesirable. Dr. Bruce Smith, inspector of Hospitals and Charities for Ontario, gives strong endorsement to this view. "We are ready in Canada providing comfortable homes for hundreds of children brought out from the orphanages of Great Britain, while keeping many of our native-born young Canadians housed up in our institutions." The Renfrew Journal says it would like to see every child in the whole wide world well cared for and in a good home, but believes that emphasis should be laid on the duty that Canadians owe to their own country and their own country's children. "Until Canada can attend properly to its own neglected children it would be folly for this land to take up any further of the burden of other lands' neglected children."

Returns to Canada.

Another Canadian who has heard the call of his native land, and determined to return from Uncle Sam's domain is the Rev. O. C. S. Wallace, M.A., LL.D., formerly chancellor of McMaster University, who has accepted a call issued him by the Westmount Baptist Church, Montreal. Dr. Wallace has been for the past four and a half years ministering to one of the largest and most influential Baptist churches in the Southern States, the historic First Baptist Church of Baltimore, Md. Previous to that he had been pastor of the First Baptist Church at Lowell, Mass., where he went after resigning the chancellorship of McMaster University, Toronto, in 1905.

Fish Prices Have risen.

How the price of fish has gone up may be gathered from these figures. In the year ending June 30, 1909, the fish catch of Newfoundland was 1,732,997 quintals, the value of which was \$7,338,536. In the year that ended June 30, 1912, the catch was 344,263 quintals less than in 1909, the value being \$603,167 more.

The fifth station of the Grand Trunk Railway to be robbed during the past month occurred early last Sunday morning when the station at Simcoe was entered and over \$25.00 stolen. The thieves succeeded in forcing a window and unlocking the safe. Special railway detectives were rushed to the scene and are now endeavoring to trace the robbers.

Dr. Montague To Be Premier

Will Succeed Sir R. P. Roblin in the Manitoba Legislature.

Hon. W. H. Montague was elected for Kildonan as minister of Public Works in the Manitoba Government, by nearly 400 majority. It is popularly rumored in conservative circles that he will succeed Sir Rodmond as Premier of the first Prairie Province.

Big Fish Catches at Port Stanley

Over Sixty Carloads Have Been Shipped to the United States.

St. Thomas, Dec. 1.—The largest Fall catch of fish on record here has taken place during the past ten days at Port Stanley, some fishermen making daily hauls of twenty tons from their nets. Over sixty carloads have been already shipped to the United States, which will sell for over \$100,000. The fish sell from 4 to 5 cents per pound, and it is expected before the bir run is over another sixty carloads will have been shipped, which will bring a total of \$200,000. This will be divided up among the owners of the eighteen tugs fishing at the port.

On Back of Mail Matter

So long as they are unlike postage stamps in design, and are placed on the backs of letters, Christmas Seals, they aren't "Stamps" any longer—will be permissible on mail matter. This is the effect of a fiat issued by the Postmaster-General at Ottawa a day or so ago, and it will set at rest many doubts which arose last year when an order was promulgated which bade fair to destroy one of the sources of revenue open to Charitable Organizations in Canada.

Several philanthropic bodies use little Seals, the best known of them being the National Sanitarium Association, which converts the proceeds to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives. In compliance with the request for a design which will not confuse Mail Clerks, this Association has had a new Seal made to take the place of the well known Santa Clause in green red. This year's design shows a mediaeval Knight in full armour, with double cross shield on his arm and on the hand which encloses the picture appears the words, "The White Crusader." The first supply of the Seals will number three million and the enthusiasm which schools and private concerns are taking up the work of distribution for costs that this inexpensive and unobtrusive form of Christmas giving will this Christmas exceed all previous records.

Reactionary Storms will be central on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th, with the disturbances probably extending over the 6th, the date on which the Moon passes over the celestial equator at the apogee. Squalls of winter rain, wind and thunder will be natural on and near the 6th, followed by barometer, westerly gales and cold, clearing weather.

A Regular Storm Period extends from the 6th to the 13th being at its center on the 9th. Let it be remembered that this period is at the annual time of magnetic and electric excess, growing out of the inclination of the Earth's magnetic pole to the Sun's electrical equator. Auroral perturbations, earth-currents of natural electricity, through the Earth and along all conducting substances, often interfering with telegraphic operations, reach a maximum activity from about the 5th to the 15th of December. Such disturbances will pass a crisis this month from the 10th to the 15th, notably on the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th. A marked earthquake period is also central on the 13th, involving the 10th to the 12th to the 16th. About the 9th, the barometer will show approaching storm conditions in the west, and these conditions will increase as they move eastward breaking into active storms of wind, rain and snow and blizzard within forty-eight hours of Saturday the 18th. Prolonged boreal storms, with high and perilous gales will be encountered on the Atlantic ocean and coasts, throughout this part of the month.
