

Apple Evaporator Destroyed by Fire.

Jarvis Visited by Destructive Fire on Saturday Evening—Loss, \$6000.00.

About 7.30 o'clock on Saturday evening last the Jarvis Apple Evaporator was totally destroyed by fire, together with a small quantity of evaporated stock.

The fire was discovered by Mr. Crawford, gateman at the G. T. R. crossing, and it apparently originated in the west drying kiln. The entire building was soon a mass of flames, notwithstanding the prompt action of many willing hands who promptly responded to the alarm.

By the concerted action of those present assisted by streams of vinegar, cider and beer from the cider mill and pickle factory (little water being available) the other new buildings were saved.

As the season's output had been shipped, there was little stock in the building, and it was the intention of the management to close down this branch of the business in a few days.

The evaporator was owned by John Brown, who estimates their loss at about \$6000, partly covered by insurance.

Death of Mrs. Gussitt.

She passed away on Tuesday, Dec. 9, at the home of her son, Charles Gussitt, at the time of her death. She is survived by three daughters and six sons. The daughters are Mrs. (Judge) Snider and Mrs. David Thompson, Hamilton; Mrs. Walter Thompson, Niagara Falls. The eldest son, H. J. Gussitt, is manager of the Bank of Commerce at Barrie.

Stock and Seed Judging Convention.

Two Day Meeting for Haldimand and Norfolk Farmers at Jarvis Dec. 15-16.

THIS Stock and Seed Judging Convention is being held under the auspices of the Farmers' Institute Branch and the local branches of the Department of Agriculture for the counties of Haldimand and Norfolk.

The days of the Convention are set for Thursday and Friday, December 15 and 16, in the town of Jarvis, this being the most central point between the two counties. G. A. Fritman, Superintendent Farmers' Institute, is expected to be present, and the instructor will be J. M. McCallum, Shakespeare, on Heavy Horses; A. C. Hallman, Breslau, on Dairy Cattle; G. S. Peart, Burlington, on Seeds.

These men are practical demonstrators of wide experience.

The Seeds will be judged in Jarvis Music Hall. A number of samples will be examined for impurities and plenty of time will be given for discussion.

The Stock will be exhibited and judged in Horne's Livery Barn. A Lecture and demonstration by the instructor based on the animals in the ring, illustrating the desired type in each.

An opportunity for each one to personally examine and place the animals in each class. A discussion of placing, led by the judge, and general summing up of points.

Friday, December 16—10 a. m.—Seed Judging, G. S. PEART.

2 p. m.—Dairy Cattle, A. C. HALLMAN.
