Report Co. Roads Committee

Gentlemen.—Report Co. Engineer No. 1—1913 was read and attached hereto.

The matter of resignation of present Engineer was dealt with and has been accepted with regret. Recommend that position of Roads Superintendent be advertised forthwith. Recommend that a committee, consisting of Messrs Avery, Kett, and Chairman of committee wait on Alex. Forbes, regarding lease of quarry on his property on Hamilton Plank road. That Co. Quarry at Nelles Corners be developed along the lines approved of by Highway Department forthwith. Following road be built by contract,—viz.: 9 miles of Road No. 1, east of village limits of Cayuga to Teet's Store in Canboro; 17 miles of Road 2, being the whole of the road known as the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road; and in addition to above that 4 miles of road known as Kaitiam Road west from Byng be built by Co on day work and that work on Indian Line Hagersville; and on Forks Road be continued. That 7 bridges be built this year Indian Line, 1 mile east of Hagersville; Forks Road, 1 mile east of Dunnville; Third Line, top of Seneca; Talbot road, east of Jarvis; Road 5, east side road of Walpole; Road 16, Canboro Road; Road 12 upper side road in South Cayuga. Recommend that an engine and pump be purchased for Byng quarry. Recommend that Council accept service of Messrs. Jackson & Kyd for engineering necessary for 1913 at figure set forth in letter to Committee attached hereto.—Submitted.

Gentlemen.—Have carefully considered program set for 1913 and beg to say that for this work we would allow \$85 per month necessary at rate of \$55 per month to include preparation of necessary plans, profiles and specifications for contracts to be let for road construction and with guarantee that whole of work executed by them will be acceptable to Highway Department.

Report No. 1, 1913

Chairman Co. Roads Committee.

Dear Sir—Beg to report that for period elapsed since last meeting no work has been carried on except quarrying of lump stone at Byng and hauling same to Forks Road whenever road have been let. Up to yesterday when hauling recommenced 12 cords of stone had been hauled down to Franconia and piled up ready for crushing next summer. Owing to road not being wide enough to pile stone on, a field was rented from Mr. McCombs, 1/2 acre in extent, for \$15. Matter was taken up with Mr. Pyle and though figure is high it was agreed on an account of good water hole at back of field, which will be available for County's use. For hauling stone is \$5 per cord. For this sum stone is loaded into wagons at quarry by teamsters, hauled a distance of just under 7 miles and piled by them about 5 feet high. Small portable bin has been taken down at this point and crusher purchased from B. Phillips is being overhauled so that it might go down while roads are good. Large traction engine is still being used for pumping at Byng quarry, a small centrifugal pump having been borrowed necessitating taking engine down into quarry, and at present is very much in the way and moreover when ground is slippery it is risky thing to take engine down into bottom. Would ask you therefore to purchase an 8 h.p. gas engine, also pump from Wm Marshall of Dunnville, which we are using. With this equipment in one corner quarry and roughly covered all necessary pumping could be done very cheaply. Present herewith a statement of Co. Engineer emergency account, together with vouchers for same.

Report of Department: This will go forward now in a day or two, all figures have been got out and accounts balanced with Treasurer's books. Part of necessary forms from Department was received Monday so that everything is now ready to be finally written up for presentation. Faithfully—A. M. Jackson, Co. Engineer
