Court Notes

Crown Attorney Murphy was in Hagersville on Monday attending the inquest into the death of Oscar Montour, an Indian who was killed by a M.C.R. express train on Saturday night. Montour, who was 35 years of age, was crossing the track opposite the station, when the fatal accident occurred. He was struck by the "Wolverine" express. The jury returned a verdict that Montour was killed by a train while crossing the track in a state of intoxication. The jury recommended that a gate be placed at the highway crossing east of the railway station on the M.C.R.

At Hagersville on Monday before Magistrates VanLoun and Crozier Thomas Cryslar was fined \$50 and costs for supplying liquor to Oscar Montour, an Indian, on Saturday evening, the night the latter was killed.

Before Magistrate Slack and Vanloun a man named Wood was also convicted of buying liquor for Roger Montour, the deaf mute, on the night of Jan. 24th when the latter was robbed of some \$40 by T. Cryslar. Four charges were laid against J. W. Reichfield, hotelkeeper at Nellis Corners, for breach of the liquor act and the charges came up before Magistrates Crozier and Vanloun at Hagersville on Tuesday. Three of the charges were dismissed, but Reichfield was fined \$100 and costs on the charge of selling liquor to Indians. R. S. Cotter of Cayuga acted for the defendant.—Cayuga Advocate.

Advertising Pays.

Oh, would that every now and then we all could journey to the pen where she is laying for us; she knows a lot, this worthy bird, and not by silence has she erred—when she would tell us what's occurred she starts the Barnyard Chorus. So, laying eggs to beat the hand, she scarce can meet the great demand which reaches out on every hand—she's busy as a beaver. Stock Judging Contest.

One of the most successful stock judging conventions in connection with the Farmers Clubs of Ontario was held Feb. 14 and 15, on the farm of Wm. Hamby, at Rockford. On Thursday afternoon, according to program, N. S. Stevenson of Ancaster, gave a lecture on the dairy cow and illustrating his remarks by the use of three of Mr. Hamby's Holstein cows, which he so kindly brought into the spacious and nicely heated tent provided for the occasion. After this, J. C. Smith of Simcoe, asked the people to look the animals over and judge them. This they did with a good deal of interest. R. S. Stevenson asked for their reasons for so placing them and a lively discussion took place after which Mr. Stevenson placed them. After this class Ivey Bros. of Jarvis brought in two thoroughbred Short Horn heifers of the beef type, and they certainly were a handsome pair, and the same procedure was gone through in this class. Mr. Fryett brought in a cow of the dairy type of the Durham breed, and also a thoroughbred bull. After this class Mr. Witham of Villa Nova showed three splendid Oxford ewes, which Mr. Smith of Simcoe gave an instructive talk on "sheep" and asked the people to place them in the manner described above. This being done the meeting withdrew until 8 o'clock when they again gathered in the school house and the meeting was opened by President, Alvin Irwin, who called upon Mr. Smith. He referred to the splendid club at Rockford and spoke to some length upon the labor question. R. S. Stevenson was then called upon and gave an interesting talk on the "War supply for the farm and the causes of typhoid fever." Dr. Reed of Georgetown took the floor and gave a splendid address on "Tuberculosis" to which all listened very attentively. Mr. Hamby was present with his gramophone and enlivened the evening with selections. The meeting then adjourned to meet on Friday afternoon in the tent, and when the hour arrived the tent was filled with ladies and gentlemen eager to see the fine horses to be shown. The first class was heavy draft, with five entries:—Wm. Howard, Jas. Hodges, Geo. Hutchinson, Andy Buck and John McPherson. The judge, Dr. Reed, gave a lecture on the "Horse" and asked the people to place them, he gave the final placing. The second class was Percherons, two entries: Wilton Honey imported mare and Morley Ward's black filly. The third class was Hackneys, three entries:—W. Thompson, Al. Somers and Frank Somers. The fourth class was Roadsters, with four entries:—Ira Caswell, Peter Bauslaugh, Harry Honey and Fred Herron. These classes were all gone through with the same as the first. Dr. Reed complimented the management upon securing such splendid horses for the occasion. He said he could easily see why one class of horses might be good in one locality where they raised that breed, but to find all four classes so well filled with such fine individuals he could not easily understand. He said he had been at this kind of work all over the province for the past five years and he never saw such a fine lot of horses not even at the winter fair at Georh. He was then told that they were all owned within one mile and a half of the village. What do you think of Rockford now? It's all right. The meeting was brought to a close and was voted as one of the best conventions ever held.
