Dissolve one ounce of yellow soap with half an ounce of borax in one pint of hot water, add two teaspoonfuls of glycerine, the same quantity of common salt, with a quarter of a pound of white starch. Then add a pint more water. The great advantage of this preparation is that it keeps for months, and a polishing iron need not be used.

HOW MUCH IS A BUSHEL?

Different States-The In United States Standard.

The principal work of the bureau of standards in Washington is to establish scientifically accurate standards for the teights and measures used in the United states. Recently the bureau has been engaged in gathering statistics to show the legal weight of a bushel of different commodities, as fixed either by national legislation for the nuruoses of the cusinstallation for the puruoses of the cus-tions or by State Legislatures for the purposes of trade withing the States. In the case of a few commodities only such as wheat, oats and peas, are legal weights uniform throughout the country, and in many cases they differ Neither do the legal weights which the bureau has listed represent a volume equal o the bushel of 2,150,42 puble inches—the United States bushel,

On account of the variations in the densities of commodities in different certainty the weight of a given volume of any emmolity such as po atoes, apples, real or corn. Since therefore the actual weight can be fixed only approximately it is important that in transference in the control of actions in which the bushel mea ure is wheh bushel is meant; that is wnether a velume of 2,15%, cubic incres r a certain number of pounds. Since these two definitions of the bushels are contrad'etery the bureau recommends that all cretice in all tran actions in wheat.

One of the strongest proofs of the hold which the Irish nation will ever have upon the hearts of its people is the affection with which they cling to the old Gaelic tongue with all of its ancient traditions, says Frederic J. Haskin in the Schenectady Gazette. The number of native Gaelic speakers in Ireland, according to the last census, was 180,000 or about one-seventh of the population.
