New Lady Scott.

London, Feb. 24.—King George V. this afternoon granted to Mrs. Robert F. Scott the rank and precedence that would have been hers had her husband, Captain Scott, the dead Antarctic explorer, been nominated a knight and made commander of the Order of the Bath. The intrepid searcher who died in the snows at the bottom of the world, with his four companions after they had reached the south pole, would have been made a knight by the King upon his return, and his widow now becomes Lady Scott.

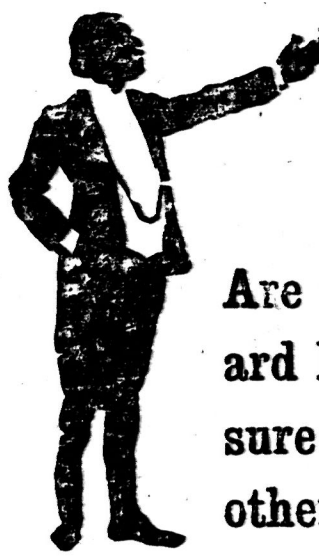
