Christmas Cheer

Before the church bell summoned worshippers to early service in many instances before the day had dawned, the celebration of Christmas began in many homes. Excitement curtailed the slumbers of many a little believer in patron of childhood and his annual benevolences. Thus it was that scores were greeted at many a lighted house by the sound of trumpet and drum and other notes, mellifluous enough to the ear of the young performers, but somewhat disturbing to the sleepy adult. Evidences of Christmas activities increased upon the streets as the morning advanced. New toys were tested. The church bell at St. Paul's church called Christians to celebrate with prayer and praise the anniversary of the birth of Christ. Worshippers hastened to and from the church for the weather was delightful and the congregations large. Then began the family reunions to which the day was voted in the majority of Jarvis homes. Relatives and friends gathered about the Christmas dinner table to participate in the Yuletide feast. The fine bright day tempted many into the open air, but there was not the feverish haste which characterized the wayfarer of the days preceding the festival. By hospitable offices and friendly greetings the people of Jarvis sought to realize that Christmas ideal of "peace on earth, good-will to men." The social intercourse of the home fireside was the dominant feature of the day's celebrations.

Nomination Meetings.

On Monday afternoon a large number of the ratepayers of Walpole Township assembled in Chamber's Hall for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Township Council. S. A. Thompson of Nanticoke, the courteous clerk of the municipality received the nominations and was subsequently elected chairman of the meeting for the discussion of township affairs. The Reeve of the Township, J. J. Parsons, was the first speaker and gave in a clear, concise and pleasing manner an account of the work of the Council during 1912, paying special attention to the question of new bridge over the highway. The speaker was able to illustrate his statements by referring to a large map of the Township which he had prepared for the meeting. Mr. Parsons was followed by Messrs. G. L. Miller and S. Winger, other nominees for the Reeve-ship, who also gave interesting addresses. W. J. Fallis, Township Treasurer, distributed the annual financial statements for the information of the ratepayers. W. D. Rouleau, Deputy Reeve, spoke especially concerning the Good Roads movement with which he has been closely identified. After a number of other addresses it was moved by J. C. Sanderson seconded by G. L. Miller that it is the wish of the meeting that the members of the Council of 1913 be elected for the ensuing year by acclamation. This motion was carried. It is still uncertain, however, whether there will be an election or not.

On Monday evening the citizens of Jarvis village held a similar meeting, the Village Clerk, C. E. Bourne, receiving the nominations. Andrew Rodgers was elected chairman of the meeting for the discussion of municipal questions. During the evening, Reeve, I. W. Holmes, gave a clear and interesting account of the Council's work for the year, the financial statement being read and explained by the Treasurer, James Noble. In addition to the members of the 1912 Council Messrs. Geo. Irwin and Lewis Miller were nominated. Mr. Irwin however, who was present, declined to allow his name to stand. Addresses were made by Dr. Lewis, senior councillor, D. C. Allen, councillor, J. S. Burwash, R. W. Smith, Wm. Parkinson and Mr. Eddy.
