Female help through Ontario this season has been scarcer than ever before. According to reports received from some of the centres the question is a serious one. Under the factory act women were not allowed to work over time only a very limited number of hours, and a permit must be granted from the Ontario Department of Agriculture for the purpose. Many of those who were given this permit have made application for a second one in order that the overtime work hours might be doubled, but the request has been refused as a matter of principle.

A South Carolina lynching party broke into a jail, dragged out a negro imprisoned for debt and hanged him, pinning on the dead body a note bearing the words, "From admirers of Governor Bleasie." It was Governor Bleasie a few days ago who declared that there would be no prosecution of lynchers who should kill negroes guilty of crimes against white women.
