Rev. G. Johnstone Has Passed Away

Welland, Jan. 5—Rev. Gabriel Johnstone, D. D., died at his home here this morning after a brief illness of a few days though he had been in declining health for many months. He was one of the best known ministers in the Niagara diocese. He was born at Edenton, North Carolina, in 1843, and was educated at the University of North Carolina, where he graduated in 1861. He left the University of North Carolina in his junior year and took part in many memorable battles of the Civil War. At the close of the War he resumed his studies and took the degree of B. A. from Trinity College, N. C., and was ordained to the ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church in 1870 by Bishop Atkinson in Edenton, his native town. He was called to Grace Church at Utica, N. Y. After remaining there for a short time he was called to the Colorado diocese and held parishes at Lamar City and Georgetown. During that time he received calls both to Sacramento, Cal., and Canada. He came to Canada in 1877, and was first stationed at Jarvis, Ont., where he remained until 1899, when he came to Welland and took charge of Holy Trinity Church, of which he remained rector until about four years ago, when he was obliged to retire owing to failing health. While in Welland he accepted an invitation of the S. P. G. to lecture throughout England in the society's interests and visited all the principal Cathedrals. For several years he held the position of chaplain of the 44th Lincoln and Welland Regiment, and on retirement was appointed honorary major. He was also prominent in Masonic circles. In 1871 he was married to Alice Kate Killaly, of Ottawa, daughter of the late John Killaly, who survives, besides three daughters and three sons.
