A Crop That Counted

Hicks' Forecasts- January

A regular storm period covers the 19th to the 24th, being central on the 21st. Moon is at extreme north on the 20th, full on the 22nd, and in perigee on the 23rd. This period will culminate on and touching the 22nd, 23rd and 24th, progressing eastward, in low barometer and rain southward with stiff blizzards and high gales northward, all followed by rising barometer and a cold wave sweeping from the northwest far into the south.
