J. J. Parsons, Esq., Reeve of Walpole, and Warden of the County, was nominated by the Liberal Convention at their meeting in Cayuga on Thursday last, as their standard bearer in the next Federal election.

Unanimous nominations were first tendered to Mr. R. F. Miller, and to Mr. Jacob Kohler, the former Legislative member, who redeemed the riding, but both gentlemen declined. Then nominations were called for and the names of Messrs. J. J. Parsons, D. Z. Gibson and J. W. Richardson submitted, the latter withdrew. Following short speeches by these gentlemen a ballot of the delegates was taken, and Mr. Parsons was found to have a majority of the votes cast. His nomination was thereupon made unanimous and a resolution enthusiastically passed expressing confidence in the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and congratulating the "Old Chief" on the magnificent fight being waged on behalf of Liberalism.
