Buckner-Roulston.—That the report of the Finance committee be adopted as read.—carried.

Roulston-Kett.—That leave be given to introduce a bill to provide for the liabilities and general expenditure of the county of Haldimand for the year 1913 and that the bill be read a first time.—carried.

Buckner-McBurney.—That a bill to provide for the liabilities and general expenditure be read a second time.—carried.

Holmes-Sorge.—That the by-law to provide for the liabilities and general expenditure be read a third time, signed, sealed and numbered as in the original motion.—carried.

That a further sum of six thousand dollars be taken up on the credit obtained by the County from the Canadian Bank of Commerce and that the Warden and Treasurer, sign note for the same.—carried.

Avery-Hornbrook.—That the sum of \$800 be advanced to each of the high schools of the county.—carried.

Buckner-McBurney.—That the equalization for the county of Haldimand for 1913 remain the same as for 1912.—lost.

Cline-McBurney.—That the Warden be a delegate to meet the delegates from other counties of the province at a convention to be held in the city of Toronto to have a more equitable equalization of assessment of railway property as compared to firm lands, and that the Clerk be instructed to notify the Clerk of the county of Grey of this appointment.—carried.

Roulston-Smelser, in amendment.—That the assessment of the several municipalities in the county of Haldimand for 1913 be:—Canboro, per acre, \$28; Cayuga North, 33; do. south, 38; Dunn, 30; Moulton, 26; Raisham, 40; Oneida, 39; Seneca, 35; Sherbrooke, 40; Walpole, 40; Cayuga, 150; Caledonia, 185; Dunville, 300; Hagersville, 190; Jarvis, 85.
