One Handred Anniversary

On the 10th of September next, one hundredth anniversary of the battle of Lake Erie, a celebration will be held of great Interest to the people of Canada as well as the United States. The British and American officers killed in that battle Offer an opportunity for having and will then the re-interred with due ceremony. The Perry memorial and centenary commission is now erecting at the spot, which heretofore has been marked only by a pyramid of cannon-balls, a magnificient monument, consisting of a plaza 785 feet long and 461 ft. wide, which will rise in a gradual ascent from the waters addrethe bay on one side and Lake Erie Pretty little brown and navy striped taffeta on the other to a height of twelve. At one end of the plaza will be an historical museum, and at the other end a building emblematic of the one hundred years (f peace between Great Britain and United States. In the middle will be a doric column of granite 330 feet high, 45 feet in diameter at the base and 35 at the top, surmounted by a spectator's gallery reached by electric elevators, above which will tower an immense tripod holding a peacon light, visible for miles over Lake Erie, guiding the ships of commerce. On the occasion mentioned, services will be conducted jointly by British and Ameri can clergyman, as was done a century ago The principal orations will be delivered by ex-President Taft and a prominent Canadian not yet designated.

Took Years to Develop. The control of London traffic by the police has been a matter of slow. evolution, says The London Chronicle. A century ago when George IV. dined with the Lord Mayor soon after his accession, it took his escort five hours to force a way through the crowd, which filled the streets from his palace to the Guildhall. And it was not until about thirty years ago that the existing system of regulating traffic at crossings was instituted. At the beginning it required four policemen at every important junotion to do with difficulty what two constables and sometimes one now effect by a motion of the hand. But the men in blue stuck to their task asd hung on to horses' heads and summoned rebellious drivers till the reign of law and order was established

Perhaps one of the best stories told of Lord Claud Hamilton, chairman of the Great Eastern Railway and M.P. for South Kensington, who has announced his retirement from Parliament at the next election, is that concerning a remark he once made when speaking to the electors whose suffrages he was seeking.
