#### Rose Growing

In Canadian Life and Literature the terms Flower Cirl has come to be associ ated with the marriage ceremony and June is the month of weddings, as 16 is of Roses and the flower girls of Southern Europe and England with their winsome faces and fragrant merchandise has be come familiar to courists as one of the most picturesque features of a trip abroad. In Canadian village life, attention is not given to the extent it should be by the beautifying of our homes by the growing of beautiful and attractive flowers. In English home life even the cottager

has his flower garden and the most beautiful, as well as the most generally grown flower is the rose, the floral emblem of England. Of course, the moist damp climate there, is more suitable to the growth of the rose, than is the more severe cilmate of Canada and therefore in this paper I have not touched on the tender varieties of the such as the Tea rose etc. which are a very beautiful and fragrant class. Roses have been queens among the flowers from the far away morning of the World. The legends of every land testify to the bigh place that have been held by roses, from the beginning of song and story, and to day roses remain the favourite flowers of a vast majority of on people and 1 purpose in this paper making

Roses my subject. There are roses adapted to every climate and every soil, and it is the aim of this paper to help you in choosing for your | garden the varieties with which you can reasonably hope to have success.

It is no less my purpose to point out to von how to begin the cultivation of roses for most of the failures in rose growing are due to the fact that the right kind of start is not made and many disappointments in rose culture are caused by the purchase of plants not adapted to amateur culture than anything else.

If the people who buy roses were but familiar with the method of propagation used by ordinary growers they would un derstand why so many plants die as soon as they are unpacked. It is those who buy cheap puny plants, who make up the chorous "we cannot grow roses." thrifty hardy rose cannot be sold profitably for the bargain prices at which many florists offer them. Home g own bushes grown on their own roots and from a reliable nursery in your own district, two years old are the ones to buy and perhaps a word of explanation may not be amiss as to what I mean by growing on their own roots. The department sorres of many cities offer roses grown in Holland. These Dutch roses are almost all budded or grafted on a wild rose root and then roots often send up shoots that belong to the wild variety and so weaken the budded

Now having selected your nurseryman the next thing is what varieties to plant. In the first place do not plant too many varieties to start your rose garden with. Get good hardy kinds of easy culture and free bloomers.

For white I would recommend Madam Plantin, not a large bloom, but very sweet scented and a most profuse bloom, also Maman Cochet, the standard everbloom ing rose, perfect in hardiness, vigor and

profusion of blcom. For pink, Magna Charta, very larg and fragrant, an exceedingly popular garden rose. John Hopper, a large double flower, shell pink and perfectly hardy. Crimson, the first I would name would be Offer an opportunity for having General Jac quemind, very rich and velvety, a strong grown perfectly hardy and standard garden rose. Etoile de France, We are equipped to produce the rich velvet crimson flower, full and beautiful, a grand outdoor rose. I do not protect my own bushes, but in our climate with its severe winters, a few evergreen bushes thrown over them to keep the snow

around them is a good protection.

Now I purpose to give you directions for culture as simple as possible. Do not plant in a shady situation, a nice sunny open spot is best. The soil should be prepared in the fall by digging deeply Any good garden soil will do, emished by well rotted stable fertilizers, for the rose is a good feeder. Send your order during the winter months, so as to have the plants come along early in the spring Plant them as soon as possible after arrival and pour lots of water among the roots when planting. Plant an inch deep er than they were in the nursery and keep the top soil loose and friable. Do not let the shoots grow more than three feet high. Pinch off the top to make them branch. Remember the finest roses are grown on the new wood. The after cultivation simply consists of cutting out some of the old brancues every year, spraying to clean them of nsects, digging among them. manuring, and cutting the branches back at least two and a half feet high. Keeping the insects off is best accomplished by spraying them with a solution of whale oil soap, three ounces to the water, then add the necessary quantity or cold rain water. Spray the bushes before the buds open, then two or three times until the flowers come, spraying underneath the leaves, for the rose aphis, the worst pest the rose has, always attacks the under side of the leaf and sucks the nices out of it. Be sure and wet the leaves thoroughly. Whale oil soap comes in lb tins, 25 cents, and it can and may b. purchased of any seedsman. In cutting the flowers cut with good long stems for even the June roses will often give blossoms in the fall if the bush is cut well backand a new growth secured. Having brought you thus far on the

road to rose growing, I hope the few directions I have given you may be helpful to you, and any that may engage in the delightful recreation I hope may enjoy the same pleasure that I have had, both in the growing of the plants and the giving of the blooms to your less fortunate neighbours, who have not perhaps the time to engage in the elevating pastime, for a thing of beauty is a joy for ever.
