Apples will be Only 50 p. c. Crop.

In the second report of this season on the outlook of the apple crop in the Niagara district, Mr. P. W. Hodggett, Director of the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture, has only a meagre fifty per cent. average crop to promise. "From the reports coming to us, said Mr. Hodggett to The Globe yesterday, "that estimate will hold good all over the province. The early season prospects for the apple crop could not have been better, but the cold weather got in its destructive work and a heavy falling of resulted."

The report from the Niagara peninsula also states that the outlook for early peaches, including St. John's and and Crawford's is for a light crop. Late peaches promise a uniformly fair yield. In the apple orchards Baldwin's and spens are light, but greenings and kings will average well. The Fruit Branch has worked out the following percentages to show the estimated return on the general crop of the district: Red Currants 73 per cent., gooseberries 70 per cent., raspberries 84 p. c., cherries 76 p. c., Japan plums, 70 p. c., European plums 68 p. c., early peaches 72 p. c., late peaches 76 p. c., pears 75 p. c., grapes 75 p. c., tomatoes 68 p. c.
