Doctors Gould and Alway were within a few minutes doing everything possible to relieve his suffering. A plucky girl was Miss Catharine Damion, who cared for him until the arrival of the doctors and also assisted them. He was so badly burned that his flesh pulled off when his clothing was removed. It seemed marvellous that he retained consciousness under the circumstances and would constantly ask for water. He was removed to his home where he died shortly after midnight. Mr. Durling was an industrious young man and one of the best workers in the factory. He leaves a wife and four children, also nine brothers and sisters to mourn his death. The funeral was held on Friday, 25th, from his late residence at 5 o'clock.—Waterford Star.
