It practically prohibits bottle-selling in 248 municipalities in which there are bar-rooms but no licensed shops. It thus cuts off 248 sources of supply from which some thirty residents of Local Option districts were formerly able to procure bottles of liquor. There are only 86 municipalities left in which there can be retail selling of liquor to be drunk on the premises.

Hick's June Forecasts

A regular storm period involves the 9th to the 12th. This period is coincident with the annual magnetic and electrical crisis which is at its centre each year on June 11th. Its peculiar intensity is noticeable from about the 5th to the 12th, 10th, 11th and 12th. Strong Earth Currents, disturbing telegraphic wires and seismic outbursts, among the phenomena peculiar to this period. Heavy storms of wind, rain and thunder will touch many sections in their eastward sweep over the country on and touching the 10th, 11th and 12th. Thunderstorms at this and other June periods will swing back and come upon you from points of the sky after storms have seemingly passed over your vicinity. Whirlwinds and tornadoes often grow out of these erratic June storms. Keep in touch with your barometer and then you will know when atmospheric conditions are ripe for erratic and dangerous antics. Upon the whole the general outlook for June is not abnormal, excepting local downpours and cloudbursts, with lack of diffused rains in wide sections of the country. But fields that are grassy and weedy, and for the soil to bake and burn, and heat of the summer months to follow. Much of the sheet lightning, and the flashing from cloud banks from the horizon during June evening, is harmless, although it may be very brilliant and startling. Such displays of electricity are usually without thunder, and rarely if ever send bolts to the earth. But the concentration of June thunders is always in the near vicinity, the greatest care should be exercised against danger. The thoughtless habit of many people to take shelter under trees in a June thunder storm is risky and reprehensible in the extreme. Thousands of human beings, as well as great numbers of live stock are killed under trees to which they fly for shelter in June showers and thunder storms. Windows and doors should be closed in the crisis of such storms. Keep away from conducting walls, chimneys, stove pipes and all substances calculated to become conducting mediums of electrical discharges. Never follow a plow in fresh moist earth during a fierce, near by thunder storm. Barns and stables are unsafe refuges at such times.
