The First Train on October 15th.

The progress on the building of Lake Erie and Northern Railway between here and Galt has been of a marked nature. In fact, it is now announced that the first train from here to Port Dover will be run on October 15th. The progress on the line from here to Port Dover will be almost as fast. The 7,500 tons of steel rails necessary for the entire equipment, have all been rolled at the Soo and are now piled up ready for immediate shipment. They are 85 lbs weight, or the same weight as used on all main line tracks. The angle bars, spikes and bolts for the entire system are also now ready for shipment, by the Hamilton Steel and Iron Company. For the work from 25,000 to 225,000 will be required. Sixty thousand were contracted for, and it looked as if there might be some delay regarding the remainder. Under the circumstances the company decided to go at it on their own account and purchased four timber bushes, two at Waterford, and two north of Brantford. They have their own mills at work and are turning out the necessary supply daily.

Strange Disease Puzzles Doctors

London, June 1.—Physicians in many parts of England, France are puzzled by the spread of a mysterious, throat complaint, the chief symptom of which is a slimy exudation from the tonsils or at the back of the throat, varying from a slight rash to what seems a most acute form of diphtheria. Frequently also there is a severe swelling of the glands of the neck. It has caused several deaths. The complications include erysipelas, high temperature and weakness of the heart action. Bacteriological examinations have failed to discover the germ of diphtheria. Some physicians are inclined to believe that it is a non typical form of diphtheria or measles.

New Insect Discovered.

London, June 4.—A new insect, which has only just been discovered, is to be seen at the exhibition of the Royal Society, which was opened at Burlington House a few days ago. It has been named the protura, and makes its appearance in public for the first time. It is barely discernible under a microscope it has a striking resemblance to a monoplane. The protura is extremely rare. It is found in heat and there are only a few existing specimens in the world. Of its activities nothing is known so far, beyond that it lives on decayed vegetables and that its span of life does not extend beyond three days.

Arson in Brantford

Brantford, June 4.—Two attempts were made here within an hour to burn down the mill of the Watson Manufacturing Company. Paper and rags were placed among boxes on the second and third storeys of the plant and ignited, but employees caught the fire in each case before it spread. A boy employee suspected of the incendiarism was dismissed following an investigation by company officials. Three hundred girl employees were in the mill at the time.

No Parcel Over 11 Pounds

Under the provision of the Parcel Post Act moved by Hon. Mr. Helletier, no parcel to be carried by post shall weigh over 11 pounds, and shall not be greater in size than 72 inches in length and girth combined. The parcels to be carried shall include all kinds of products, farm or factory, and the postage must be prepaid. The postal rates shall be determined later by the Postmaster-General. In regard to officials the act says: "Under the authority of the Governor in Council two officers may be appointed as inspectors and supervisors of the parcel post system at a salary of \$1,800 an appointment, with an increase of one hundred dollars up to a maximum of \$3,500. The bill was withdrawn for this session."
