### Three Men Badly Injured

About 10.30 o'clock on Saturday morning three men were badly injured at the Smith farm near Nixon. Mr. Martin Smith had been engaged in putting a roof on his newly erected barn. He and two of the carpenters, viz. Pearce Brock and Vern Jarvis of Waterford were at work at one section of the roof when the scaffold gave way allowing the men a drop of thirty feet into a pile of boards. Roy Boughtner of Nixon and Mr. Winger of Simcoe were engaged on another part of the building and immediately assisted the injured men. Dr. F. J. Sheahan was the first physician to arrive. It was learned that Mr. Smith was suffering from the dislocation of his left wrist, injuries of the spine and was badly lacerated about the head. Mr. Pearce Brock was the most unfortunate, he sustained a fracture of the left hip and shoulder. Mr. Vern Jarvis suffered concussion of the brain and internal injuries which however have not proved serious. The men had just commenced putting the shingles on the roof when the accident occurred. The men are being cared for at Mr. Smith's home. It will be some days before they can be taken to their homes.

### Great Future for Port Dover Claim of Marine Men

That the Canadian Government is realizing more and more each day the inestimable value of its waterways and ports is evidenced in the fact that it has appropriated \$50,000 for the dredging of a harbor at Port Dover. In addition to the dredging \$300,000 will be spent by the Government and private corporations in contemplated improvements. The harbor, which at present is very shallow, yet in a protected position, will be dredged to a depth of eighteen feet. Canadian Marine Men predict a great future for Port Dover, which at present is not much more than a fishing port, and claim that in a few years it will be a Canadian Buffalo, with all of the boat lines making it a regular stop on their routes. The Port is to be fitted up with the most modern loading devices and will be fully equipped for the handling of cargoes, both unloading and loading.

Already a boat line is being planned to cross Lake Erie at Pt. Dover as soon as the harbor is completed. The Lake Erie & Northern Railroad Co. is now planning to build a car ferry to transport cars from the American to the Canadian side of the lake, and is also building a railroad from Brantford, Ont. to Port Dover. Work is already commenced on the harbor and by the time it is completed the car ferry will be built and the railroad on the Canadian side completed, so that the harbor will be in immediate use. The claim that it will be a great port is made by vesselmen because they believe that the thousands of cargoes of freight now shipped to Western Canada by rail will then all be taken by water. The Canadian cities will be greatly benefited by the new harbor is set forth by vesselmen on both sides of the boundary. All of the steel coal and other shipments to Canadian cities from this side of the line go by rail, while with a good harbor at the Canadian lower end of Lake Erie, it will go by water. Hamilton, Toronto, Brantford and Galt, it is said, will greatly benefit from the new harbor.—Detroit News.
