
A nurse must be very particular in carrying out the doctor's orders as to whether the medicine should be taken before or after a meal, as grave results may follow if the instructions are not strictly carried out. It is also necessary to be very exact in giving just the right quantity as stated in the medicine bottle; there should always be a measured medicine glass for the purpose. The medicine should be poured from the botthe on the side away from the label, so that no drops will fall upon it and disfigure the instructions, which should be read every time before administering a dose. Regularity, neatness, and exactnees are very essential qualities to those who have charge of a sick room.

STIMULANTS.

The use or disuse of alcohol has been a vexed question for many years. Alcohol is the result of a chemical action which takes place in the juice of grapes when exposed to the air at a certain semperature. It appears more or less in all intoxicating beverages; for instance, ales and lager beer contain about five per cent. Wines, such as sherry, port, Madeira, contain about 20 per cent., whilst brandy, whisky, rum and gin contain about 50 per cent. As scon as alcohol is swallowed it has an influence upon every tissue and organ of the body; it sends an increased flow of blood to the brain, which excites the nerwous system, but this stimulation is always followed by a reaction of exhaustion and gradual depression. When taken in large quantities it brings about a confusion of ideas and a loss of control. It overtaxes the heart, causes an expansion of the blood .vessels, which wings about flushing of the face. This redness generally becomes permanent when a person becomes a regular drinka tremendous mistake for any man or woman to take a little alcohol in order to give an appetite; by sodoing the appetite is artificial, and the stomach is seriously injured, as it induces a chronic inflammation of the lining membrane of that organ. MUMPS.

A QUESTION OF ETHICS.
