Poor Women Make the Best Mothers

Poor women make better mothers than those who have every animal comfort that money can provide, is the open declaration of Mrs. C. B. Alexander, President of the New Jersey State Board of Children's Guardians. She says that the poor woman shows greater love and devotion and is less heartless in dealing with her children than the mothers in the upper strata of society. She further declares that economic conditions bring about this condition. "I do not mean," said Mrs. Alexander, "that all rich mothers are heartless or neglectful of their children, for I have known many wealthy women who devote their entire time to their little ones, but they have not the privilege of sacrifice that the poor woman has, and sacrifice feeds affection. It means nothing for the wealthy woman to buy her children the most expensive toys, while for the poor woman who gives her little one a 10-cent trinket it means a sacrifice. It is not the fault of the wealthy woman so much as the fact that wealth creates selfishness and that the mother who does not have to sacrifice becomes selfish without realizing it. The poor mother will not leave or desert her children, while the rich mother thinks nothing of taking a trip away and leaving her offspring in the care of nurses—sometimes, I must acknowledge, the children are better off. Then, too, the rich mother is usually too occupied with her social duties to give her children the personal care that the poor mother must give. In making out my report to Governor Wilson," continued Mrs. Alexander, "I called his attention to the fact that there was an increase of eighty children in the care of the board this year over last making a total of 1,080.

The reasons I gave were loss of work, low wages, high cost of living, ignorance and curse of drink, the last only being a defect of character, and the others to be remedied by a more nearly equal distribution of wealth. The poor woman who is the mother of the future, as somebody seemed to think. That was my point of view. That is why I called attention to the fact that it is not the poor woman, but the wealthy woman who really neglects her children. Conditions could be greatly improved, Mrs. Alexander said, by employers raising the wage and making a universal wage for every calling. Less money in her estimation, should go into the dividends of corporations and more into wages; that was what she meant by a more equal distribution of wealth. As things are now, she pointed out, the poor man with six or eight children cannot always make enough to support them, or he gets out of work and discouraged.

"The stronger natures," said she, "can stand this, but the weaker ones give and desertion takes place. It is all the result of poverty, and it should not be. I believe in time it will all be eliminated if we go about it right. We are selfish when we sit down quietly and let young girls work for \$3 a week when we know they cannot live on that. The rich mother scarcely knows of the terrible crimes she is able to protect her daughter from, that the daughters of the poor are exposed to. These are all conditions that can be eliminated by 'jacking up' every part of our intricate economic system. The progress will be slow but I believe it will be done."

John McKnight Dead.

After a short illness, Mr. John McKnight of this town, died last Saturday in his 63rd year. Mr. McKnight had been a resident of this county for many years, being a son of Mr. James McKnight, the well-known lumberman and farmer, who died a few years ago. Mr. John McKnight was a farmer in the township of Windham until several years ago, when he went to Norwich and became a hardware merchant. Last autumn he retired from business and moved to Simcoe.

The funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the home of his son, Mr. W. Jas. McKnight, burial being made in Oakwood Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Day had charge of the services, being assisted by two former pastors of Mr. McKnight, Dr. Barnet of Norwich, and Rev. J. Robertson of Pt. Dover. The bearers were the six brothers of the deceased: Daniel, Andrew, Augustus, Henry, William and James McKnight. Two sisters also survive, Mrs. Peter Nicol of Simcoe, and Mrs. James Edgeworth of Toronto. Mr. McKnight leaves a widow and three sons, James George and Fred who live in Simcoe or vicinity.—Simcoe Reformer.

New Regulations Governing the Free Entry of Pure Bred Animals

On the first of April this year there will come into force new regulations governing the free entry to Canada of animals for the improvement of stock. To this end the following amended regulations have been adopted by Order in Council for the guidance of Importers and Custom House officers:

"1. No animal imported for the improvement of stock shall be admitted free of duty unless the owner is a British subject, resident in the British Empire, or if more than one owner each is a British subject, resident in the British Empire and there is furnished an Import Certificate in a Canadian National Record or in a Foreign Record recognized as reliable by the National Record Committee. A statutory declaration by the owner or one of the owners, that he is a British subject, or that each is a British subject resident in the British Empire and that such animal is the identical animal described in such certificate must be provided, and that such animal is being imported into Canada for the improvement of stock.

"2. In case such certificate is not at hand at the time of the arrival of the animal, entry for duty may be accepted subject to refund of the duty upon the production of the requisite certificates and proofs in due form satisfactory to the collector within one year from the time of entry.

"3. The form of certificate to be accepted for the free importation of animals for the improvement of stock, and the Customs procedure in connection therewith shall be subject to the direction of the Minister of Customs.

"4. The above declarations shall be attached to the Free Import Entry and may be made before the Collector, Sub-Collector, Surveyor or Chief Clerk at the port where the goods are entered or before any functionary authorized by law to administer oaths.

Under the old regulations a British subject residing in a foreign country or the citizen of another country living in Canada could secure the free entry of property registered animals, whereas under the new order foreign persons or firms are excluded from this privilege. Customs officers are required to examine carefully the animals to see that they correspond with the description contained in the Import Certificate and if they do not duty is collected. The statutory declarations required regarding citizenship and identity will it is hoped effectively prevent abuses that led up to the passing of the new regulations. As in the past animals are subjected to veterinary inspection at the port of entry. Officials of the Health of Animals Branch who do this work are required to make a report as to the color and markings. If it is found by the Canadian National Record that foreign certificates of registration do not correspond with these reports Canadian registration and Import Certificates for the animals in question are refused.
