## Hick's June Forecasts

We have a reactionary Storm Period extending over the 2nd, 3rd and 4th. Moon is in conjunction with Sun and Earth on the 4th. This, of course, gives us new Moon at high north declination. The new Moon is always at or near its greatest north point in the heavens in June. This, we hold, is one of the prime causes of maximum lightning, thunder and rain, in this solstice month. The falling barometer, and storms of rain and wind, which will develop in the west about the 2nd, will reach different longitudes in their eastward progress, on and touching the 3rd and 4th. These storms will reach their greatest extent and strength on and next to the 4th. The barometer will rise and cooler, westerly winds will follow the storms from two to three days—say about the 5th to the 7th. The first June seismic period covers the 1st to the 7th, having its centre on the 4th.

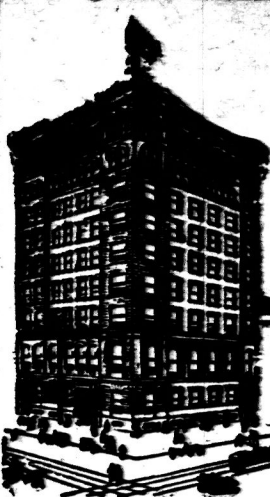
