Big Gas Gusher

Another big gas strike has been made here by Driller T. J. McCutcheon on the farm of H. A. Lymburner, four miles west of Dunnville on the Canboro Road. Your reporter was one of a party of four who went out and measured it. It was opened up and allowed to blow off for a quarter of an hour, and so strong was the pressure that fairly heavy stones thrown over the pipe, were carried up over a derick. The mercury gauge showed an open flow of considerably over a million feet, with a rock pressure of over 300 lbs and the fact that the gas was secured in the white Medina makes it all the more valuable. This well is in a territory that had been tried small results and was practically abandoned. When McCutcheon made his strike he capped the pipe, shut down and kept it dark, spending the time up to yesterday leading up farms covering two miles square with the gusher in the centre. Then he made the strike public. W. J. Aikens and the Doherty interests, both gas operators, have leases in the district. McCutcheon's leases of 3000 acres in this field are all held by him personally. His rig is now on the farm of W. S. Skelton, who will have a well drilled for himself. W. J. Aikens has a drilling plant working for him on the farm of Jas. Duff.—Dunnville Chronicle.

Distribution of Pure Bred Male Animals

Realizing that inability to secure the use of well-bred male animals is at the present time one of the greatest difficulties standing in the way of live stock development in many parts of Canada, particularly in the newly settled districts, the Dominion Department of Agriculture through the Live Stock Branch, is this year undertaking a widespread distribution of pure bred stallions, bulls, rams and boars. The original cost of the animals will be borne by the department, and they will be placed in the hands of such local organizations as agree to the conditions governing the distribution. In a word, these sires will remain the property of the Department, but the local associations will be responsible for their proper maintenance and management under the general supervision of officers of the Live Stock Branch. In the case of stallions, the members of the associations will also be required to pay a fee covering an annual insurance premium.

All animals distributed will be purchased from home breeders and will be Canadian bred. As far as possible they will be purchased in the provinces in which they are to be placed. In this way Canadian breeders may receive encouragement and their market will be increased, not only directly through the emphasis given throughout the country to the value of pure-bred sires. It may be added that it is not the intention to place the animals in sections where suitable male animals of the same class are already owned by private individuals. The aim is rather to aid sections where pure-bred sires are lacking, and as well to encourage new communities a proper and intelligent system in breeding. All bulls distributed will be purchased subject to the tuberculin test and only stallions which have passed a rigid veterinary inspection for soundness will be selected.

In order to take advantage of this form of assistance, it will be necessary for interested parties, in any section, to undertake the organization of a local association in whose hands such sires as are required may be placed. Complete information regarding the rules and regulations governing the distribution may be made upon application to the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa. Whenever possible an officer of the branch will render assistance in the perfecting of the necessary local organization.
