NO ARE LOYALISTS?

Dr. Wilfrid Campbell of Ottawa addressed the annual meeting of the United Empire Loyalists, held recently in Toronto. In the course of his address he gave an interesting quotation from a recently published book written by the historian, Charles H. Livingstone, who writes:

"It is becoming more and more widely known that 'taxation without representation' was not the cause of the American revolution, but that this was the cry used to unite the forces hostile to Britain.

"There were at that time three divisions of the people to the South, the carelessly indifferent, the very strong Loyalists, and the fiercely hostile party. The latter swayed the first and greatest class at first, but when the seriousness of the revolt dawned upon them many joined the British in the struggle that followed. These, with the second class, were the United Empire Loyalists.

"After the war many members of disbanded regiments from Great Britain came with the loyal colonists to Canada. These were known as Treasury Loyalists' or 'Military Claimants.' On the crown lands list in Toronto there were in all over 3,000 Loyalists of both classes. These were given the right by an order-in-Council signed by the King in 1790 to add U. E. after their name, and this peculiar privilege was also allowed the descendants of both sexes

'But," said Dr. Wilfrid Campbell. in turning from the historical side of his subject, "while genealogy is not to be sneered at, it may be carried too far. We who come from that sturdy stock, must carry out the work of our forebears in moulding the destiny of the Dominion.

"The men must be prepared to defend its freedom, for no people were ever needed more in the history of the Empire than are the Loyalists at the present time. The men also must teach their children to live clean upright lives, in order that we may preserve in us the traditions of our fathers."

When the larger questions are up in the British House, there is usually about one big meeting a week in the country addressed by a leader on one or other side of the debate. In this way, the leaders have a better idea of what the people think, because every big meeting educates the speaker as well as the audience. Moreover, this practice enables the leaders to get "big" speeches before the public at a time when it might be inconvenient to take up the time of the House. Other advantages are apparent. It should not be necessary to have several "big guns" on one evening. One or two leaders should be sufficient for any meeting. One meeting or demonstration by each party is not enough. There should have been or should be two or three such meetings every month.
