To drive away mice and other pests that infest the pantry, use green walnuts. Place the walnuts in the closets, cupboards, or any place where the pests are likely to be. The cure is certain and the remedy clean.

To remove old wall paper, make a thick, pasty solution by adding flour and a few ounces of acetic acid. This pasty solution should be applied with a brush to the old wall paper in quantities. After a few minutes the old paper can be removed in great strips very easily and with very little dust or dirt.

To give a soft tread to oilcloth, and also to increase its length of service, place a layer of sawdust on the floor before laying it.

To prevent the corners from wearing on table oilcloth, paste at each corner on the wrong side a square of cotton before putting the oilcloth on the table.

Alaskan Mosquitoes.

"Our summer lasted for three months and during that time by day as well as by night we had the fight of our lives against swarms of mosquitoes which for tenacity of purpose and endeavor cannot be equaled in this world and I have seen a good deal of it in my fifteen years as a soldier," said A. G. Gardner, sergeant of Company C, Twenty-second Infantry, at the Union depot, recently. Sergt. Gardner was returning home to Milwaukee, Wis., after two years spent at Fort Gibson, Alaska, some 600 miles northeast of Nome, on the Yukon.

"The mosquito maintains six posts in Alaska," continued Sergt. Gardner. "We had two companies at our post and did very little actual military duty. Our principal work was in keeping up the telegraph lines which are owned by the government. The signal corps has large representation in Alaska and the soldiers frequently are called to give that department assistance."

"I have fought mosquitoes in the woods of Wisconsin, in the flats of New Jersey, in the swamps of the Mississippi River and in the Philippines, but there are none that can equal the voracious species they have in the far north."

CONCAVE TEETH FIT OVER COB.

A little implement that has two uses has been designed by a New Jersey man. It is known as a corn splitter and scraper, and can be used either to facilitate the eating of corn from the cob or to scrape the cob to get the basis for fritters, pudding and the like. One glance at the illustration shows how the cutter works. Manipulated by the handle, the cutting end, with a row of concave teeth, is passed along the length of the cob. It can be drawn over just hard enough to rip open the kernels and make the corn easy to eat off the cob, or it can be drawn over with sufficient force to scrape over the substance into a bowl below. Many people refrain from eating corn on the cob because it is difficult to do without smearing the face with the kernels, as can be done with the implement. The eating of corn on the cob can be achieved more gracefully.

WHY MEN KILL.

Some Queer Reasons Given by the Slayings.

"Why men kill has been made the subject for investigation by a noted criminologist—Dr. Enoch Ardman.

One murderer is found to give a different reason for his crime. Whether the truth is told or not it is hard to ascertain, but reasons given are so strange with the "murderer" that they strengthen the idea that murder is really the result of insanity.

"I killed him out of pity," was the answer of Dr. Clark, the Eurasian doctor who was tried for the double murder of his wife and son. The man created intense excitement in India. This, of course, is not the original motive, such a pitiable case being the real motive.

The infamous Thomas Whitnair was once accused by his most intimate acquaintance of being kind hearted and good. He killed a complete stranger for no better reason than that he had insured his wife in an office against which Whitnair was an office agent, which Whitnair was too thick.

At 5 o'clock one morning a man walked into the police station at Franconville, near Paris.

"I have killed my wife," he said. "My name is M. Barnier and I live at 100 rue de la Chapelle. I have killed my wife because she suffered from insanity."

He was found to have told the literal truth, and his wife was a hopeless invalid, partly paralyzed and suffering from agony. He could stand it no longer, and he had to ease her sufferings, took a revolver and shot her through the head.

Some murders appear without object. One was the shooting by the so-called "Man in the Hat" of the manager of the Shoe Hotel in Tottenham Court Road, London. Stephen Titus, without any provocation, shot and killed the manager and wounded four other persons. He was sent to Broadmoor.

A man in Vienna asked a woman for a rose she was wearing. She refused. He shot her dead. Two Swiss boys killed their employers and the latter's servants in Africa.

Dr. Enoch Ardman, criminologist, has come to the conclusion that the form of insanity that causes murder is a small and that a small operation, removing the brain tissue pressing and inserting a thin silver plate, will turn the murderer into a kind hearted person.

It is hardest to overcome and perform an operation before and not after the crime. The murderer usually is homicidal in appearance and seems normal before committing a crime, and there is no way to tell if he is suffering from this form of insanity.

Is System.

"Farmers take life a little easier, thanks to their various unions and combinations, than they used to do."

The speaker was John H. Kimble of Port Deposit, secretary of the Farmers' National congress, on organization of 3,000,000 farmers. He continued:
