Rev. Dr. Robinson Has Passed Away.

Filled Many Pastors in the Conference.

(Times, Nov. 12.)

Word came by wire to Hamilton this morning of the death at Arthur Ont. of Rev. J. H. Robinson, D.D., the recently retired pastor of Simcoe Methodist Church, and the announcement was received with the deepest regret on all sides, for it was entirely unexpected. Rev. Mr. Robinson, accompanied by Mrs. Robinson, motored to Arthur a week ago Monday in ex-Ald. Thomas Lovejoy's car, Mr. and Mrs. Lovejoy and their son, Harold, going with them for a short visit, and leaving Mr. and Mrs. Robinson there with their daughter, Mrs. Brocklebank. This has been an annual trip for the past few years, and Rev. Dr. Robinson looked forward to it eagerly. He was apparently in good health when they left and also when they arrived at Arthur, the trip being a pleasant one. On the following day, however, Tuesday, of last week, he contracted a cold, and pneumonia developed. This was not thought to be dangerous at first, but later gained the mastery over him and he passed away at 10 o'clock this morning.

Rev. Dr. Robinson was one of the best men in the whole Hamilton Conference, and his death will be regretted especially by the ministers and by those who have been associated with him in his many charges. Entering the ministry of the Methodist Church when only about 20 years of age he had spent his whole life in Hamilton Conference, and had served at Merriton, Grimsby, Hagersville, Simcoe, Tillsonburg, Palmerston, Norwich and other places, in addition to two full pastoral terms in Hamilton. He was superannuated after 48 years service, last June, and went to Oakville to reside on a farm which he owned there, and near the homes of two married daughters.

Dr. Robinson was a Canadian, born near Peterboro, 69 years ago; was a thorough Canadian in spirit, and a splendid type of christian gentleman. Wherever he worked he preached the pure Gospel and lived it every day. He did eminent service for his church and his country in his own quiet way, and ever strove to raise the standard of the people.

In 1905, the last year he was with Emerald street church, he was elected president of Hamilton conference, and filled the important office with much ability. For distinguished service the degree of D. D. was conferred upon him two years ago.

Dr. Robinson is survived by a widow, one son and three daughters. Mrs. Robinson was with him during his illness. The son, Mr. C. Robinson resides in the northwest. The daughters are Mrs. Brocklebank, of Arthur, at whose home he died; Mrs. Geo. Simons and Mrs. Duncan, of Oakville.

The Short-Rating of Advertisers by Publishers Held to be Legal.

Owing to the fact that the full space contracted for in a newspaper advertising contract was not used, Justice Guerin of Montreal gave judgment last week in favor of the Montreal Star, and against Madame M. L. Millette. It was established that Madame Millette undertook to pay the Montreal Star \$190 for advertising to occupy 2000 lines in one year. During the year only 960 lines were used, and therefore, the Montreal Star claimed that defendant had forfeited the benefit of the reduced rate stipulated in the contract. Consequently, the Montreal Star charged half a cent a line in addition to the regular price. The court gave judgment for the extra half cent a line, which added \$9.80 to the bill, making a total of \$101.95, which the court ordered the defendant to pay.

Church at LaSalette Will be Beautiful.

Work on the fine new Roman Catholic church that is being erected at LaSalette, on the site of the one destroyed by fire last winter, is progressing nicely. The walls, of red pressed brick, are up, and the roof is on, and building ready for work to be done on the interior. The interior of the church that was burned was very beautiful and it is expected the new church will be as richly adorned.

Many costly donations of stations of the cross, statues, etc., have already been received. It will be some months before the church will be opened.
