New Postal Rates

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Notice is given
by the postal authorities that the
special postage rates on seeds, cut-
tings, roots, bulbs, bedding plants,
etc. have been withdrawn. They
will be subject to fourth-class mail-
rate of one cent per ounce.
Notice is given that in future all
classes of mail matter will be accep-
ted for transmission to the Yukon as
freely in winter as in summer, the
restrictions hitherto prevailing
with regard to the winter service
north of White Horse having been
removed. An interesting notice is
given under an Act of the Imperial
Parliament, newspapers published
in British possessions or protector-
ates may be registered and treated
as registered newspapers in the Uni-
ted Kingdom. Publishers of Cana-
dian dailies, tri-weekly and weekly
newspapers, may by appointing an
agent in London, and on condition
that their papers conform to the in-
land regulations of the United
Kingdom, post copies of their
newspapers there at the inland post-
paper rate of one per cent (10c)
per copy. Application for this privi-
lege should be made direct to the
Secretary, General Post Office,
London, Eng.

A Matrimonial Tangle

St. Thomas Times.—A Tillson-
burg man who was in the city over
Sunday, is in a pretty matrimonial
predicament. He recently married
a lady, who it turned out afterward
had a husband already living. She
affirmed before marrying the Till-
sonburg man that she had been de-
ceased, and he believed her. On
finding out that his supposed wife
had taken liberties with the truth
they separated and later he mar-
ried another girl. The second wife
got wind of the marriage and is now
making it unpleasant for him. The
husband of these two wives (?) is
now moving heaven and earth to
get the first woman with whom he
took nuptial vows, to sign a paper
to the effect that she misstated her
matrimonial condition when she
married the man. He is of the op-
