KING GEORGE A SPORTSMAN

George V. Likes the Out of Doors and
Enjoys It Frequently.

From the moment King George V.
ascended the throne of England his
object was to win the support and re-
spect of all classes. On that account
he has mingled with his people more
freely perhaps than any other mon-
arch of the day, with the possible ex-
ception of the intrepid Alfonso of
Spain.

King George never lets a sense of
the royal dignity keep him from en-
joying outdoor sports. He attends the
races, the shooting matches, the re-
gattas and other events of the kind
and not infrequently enters into the
contests himself with great zeal.

The King is an enthusiastic horse-
man, and when the weather is fair he
spends a couple of hours each day in
the saddle.

The King is probably the best shot
in England. A few years ago while he
was still Prince of Wales he was
classed among the five best by a
sporting authority, who now gives him
first place.

His Majesty's prowess with the gun
is referred to by an admiring paper as
excellent evidence of his perfect phys-
ical condition, for the steadiness of
nerve, accuracy of eye and quickness
of hand required to bring down fifty
brace of birds to his own gun in one
morning's shooting do not admit of
any physical disability.

The King has accomplished several
times the ambition of all grouse shoot-
ers to have four birds falling in the
air at the same time, killed by two
double barreled guns.

There is no doubt that the associa-
tion of King George with the sport
of pigeon racing, like the association
of the late King Edward, has done
much to give an impetus to the sport.

Meanings of Dyke.

"Dyke" has even more divergent
meanings than ditch in Lincolnshire
and bank in Holland. In Scotland it

is a hedge. Yet there are other north-
ern districts where it is a pond. Orig-
inally, in English at any rate, "dyke"

the dugout earth the words came to
signify ditch and mound together and
eventually in some cases the mound
alone.—London Standard.
