SENSITIVE PLANTS

The clover shuts its leaves before rain and also at night, bringing two of its three leaves face to face, and folding the third over the top, says a correspondent. The young blossoms are also carefully sheltered by enclosing leaves which move forward, in the evening, and wrap them round. I have a half-hardy blue pea, with a trefoil leaf, which folds up so accurately at night that the triple leaf looks like one pendant heart-shaped leaf. Plants which have no connection with the pea-flower family, but which possess a similarly shaped leaf, such as wood sorrel, fold their leaves at nightfall. There are two plants in the garden whose flowers sleep by day-the night-blooming stock and Lychnis ves-pertina. The former is withered and shrivelled in daylight, but expands and exhales a vanila-like odor at night. The Lychnis is white, and in bright sunshine every flower closes and hangs limply down. As the sun sets this Endymion plant awakens expectant of the moon. The drooping calices raise themselves and slowly expand and fade, and the plant, which almost died by day, is adorned anew. Its sister, the red Lychnis, shines by day, and is called diurna, but this white one has long left the beaten ancestral path and has become vespertina. As it opens, small flies appear and visit it; the calyx is of that reddish hue which they approve. The sundew which atracted flies shows the same dull red in its leaves. It is not a rarity, but few have seen its blossoms opened. A friend sent me a plant last week, assuring me that it was warranted to open, as it had already done so. Sure enough the prediction came true, and for the first time I saw the open flowers. They awoke to gaze not on leagues of moorland, but on Edinburgh dest and smoke. Sheffield, Eng., Independent.



This form of assistance has proven very popular, and during the past few months a large number of buils and several stallions have been placed in various parts of the country in the hands of local associations, formed specially for the purpose of handling and maintaining them. All animals placed remain the property of the Department of Agriculture, the local associations assuming the responibility for their maintenance and management, under the general supervision of the live stock branch.

The distribution of bulls and stallions having been brought to a close this year, the opportunity is now open to deal with applications for boars and rams. Full information regarding the rules governing the disribution, and the procedure to be followed in forming the necessary organization, may be had upon application to the Live Stock Commisioner, Ottawa.

As it is the intention to consider only such requests as are forwarded before Oct. 20, it will be necessary for distriets desiring to take advantage of this offer to act promptly.


