



### DARNING STOCKINGS.

#### Six Hints as to the Way to Do It Effectively.

Half the trouble of darning stockings may be avoided if care be taken before hand on the following points:

1. See that the lining of the shoes is kept intact. The rough edges of frayed shoe linings will soon wear holes in the heels of stockings. Paste a piece of strong muslin smoothly over all torn places in shoe linings.
2. Take special care of the toe nails. A rough, jagged or overlong toe nail soon finds its way through the stocking toes.
3. Be sure that the stocking is long enough for the foot it covers. Short-footed stockings are generally short-lived.
4. Keep a sharp lookout for dropped stitches in silk and lace stockings, and take them up at once. This may easily be done with a fine crochet hook.
5. Do not use too short stocking supports, or draw them up too tightly; you will thus avoid tearing holes in stockings.
6. Do not economize too closely on stocking price. Very cheap stockings soon fade because of poor dyes, and wear out fast from uneven weaving. Save your time and eyesight for better use than darning such stockings.

## The NEW Housekeeper

When the grate is cleaned and polished, rub all over with a piece of old velvet. Old velvet is also very useful as a final polishing cloth for waxed boards and floor cloths.

A few drops of rosewater, added to almonds will prevent their oiling when chopped.

To dislodge fish bones in the throat, cut a lemon in half and suck the juice slowly.

Egg shells may be used for cleaning vinegar cruets, water bottles and small jars one cannot get one's hand into. Crush the egg shells and put into bottle. Add a little warm water and shake well. When the ends of willow furniture fray out, soak for twenty minutes in hot water, putting the frayed parts under water. This will render the ends pliable enough to be put back in place without cracking or breaking.

For polishing silver nothing is better than old, soft nansook eaved from fine lingerie, or babies' dresses, which is almost as good as cloths.

Cake icing will not crack when cut if a little thick cream is added to it. Allow a teaspoonful to each white of egg.

After washing blond hair, the hair of a lemon squeezed in the last rinsing water will cause it to dry quickly.

When sewing matting, use raffia. It is strong and may be bought to match almost any kind of matting.

Apples cut in irregular pieces will cook more quickly in a pie than if sliced, and so the hot air comes more easily in contact with the fruit, and cooking is facilitated.

### If So, Try the Deep Breathing Cure For It.

In the season when coughs and colds are prevalent any method of preventing them and checking the first symptoms without drugs may be of inestimable value, says a physician.

When you find you have a cough and before it gets to be deep-seated, go into the air and practice deep breathing. Draw air into the lungs until they are completely distended, raising the arms above the head during inspiration to more fully expand the chest. Hold the air in the lungs for a few seconds; then breathe it out slowly. Repeat the operation a dozen times or more, and after an hour try it again.

Persistence in this treatment will often cure a newly-contracted cough in a few hours. If the cough is of long standing, pain may be felt under the shoulder blades and across the chest during the breathing, but, as this is caused by the tearing away of adhesions of the lung tissue, it will usually pass away in a day or two, and the fact that it is felt shows that the lungs need thorough inflation.

### EXPLODING FLOWERS.

#### Peculiar Specimens in Botanical Gardens at Algiers.

Flowers that explode we observed recently in the botanical garden at Algiers.

Of course there are many kinds of flowers that "explode" in order to scatter their seeds, but these are silent explosions, are brought about regularly every seedling time by nature, and are not freaks. But for a flower actually to explode with a detonation that can be heard a long distance away is another thing.

The explosion of flowers in the botanical garden at Algiers was a loud one. It was the covering of the bunch of blossoms on a great palm tree that exploded. This spathe was nearly three feet long and when the explosion occurred it was hurled a great distance, while the shattered blossoms arose like a cloud of golden smoke and covered the top of the palm.

The cause of the explosion was the sun's heat, which was unusual in its severity. The sun had actually roasted the flower to the color of dust. Then the excessive dryness of the atmosphere had caused fermentation inside the spathe. Then a great sirocco or hot wind from Sahara desert came toward Algiers and blew over the palm. This agitated the fermenting contents of the spathe and caused the explosion.

Although these explosions are rare, several other explosions of the same sort are recorded, especially from that part of the world. It has been found that an ostrich egg will sometimes explode in the same manner and from the same cause.

### ONE CRIME—THREE SENTENCES

A judge at Simcoe sentenced a youth of 20 years to ten years in the penitentiary and twenty lashes for an offense against a little girl.

A judge at London, a few days previously, sent a man of mature years, guilty of the same offense, to pall for six months, and to receive ten lashes. Which of these judges acted the more wisely? The divergence in the sentences is so great as to call for comment.

### Mending Sheet Music.

Sheet music can be easily mended with transparent sticking tape, which may be purchased on spools. The torn sheets are laid flat on a table, the torn edges fitted together and the transparent tape applied on the face of the music. The notes are clearly readable through the tape. The tape may be cut in short lengths if a curved form tear necessitates it.

When the music is worn in the covered back the most satisfactory method is to attach a very thin, white muslin binding about one-quarter of an inch wide on the machine with a very long loose stitch.

### PRISON FARMS FOR INEBRIATES

The experience of prison farms in the United States, and so far they have been established in Canada, shows that they produce much better results as institutions for the treatment of inebriates than the system under which such persons are merely kept in jail for a period of time. Possibly it does cost something to take care of inebriates on a farm and in another institution. But does it not cost more in the last analysis, to keep them on the streets or in the homes of the community? Society, by the habits which it sanctions, produces these unfortunate persons. It ought therefore, to take care of them when they reach the stage where they are no longer able properly to care for themselves.

### RECKLESS FINANCIERING.

(Philadelphia Record)

Philadelphia is not the only municipality that indulges in reckless financing. Toronto, Canada, which desires to acquire a municipal light and power system, is pushing its plans in such complete disregard of all market conditions that bankers are offering its four per cent. bonds at 84. When the commission of the bankers and other incident expenses are deducted from this sum it is a ruinous figure, it would seem, and which there may be even a possibility of Toronto in the future. Even if the new municipal plant proves a success, of which there may be a reasonable doubt, it would not justify such poor financing.

## DAMAGE BY SMUTS

### Department of Agriculture Issues Aid to Farmers.

It is estimated by the director of the Experimental Farms that smut diseases of cultivated plants cause an annual loss in Canada of at least fifteen million dollars. If these diseases were properly understood and the best known remedies applied at proper times much of this serious injury would be prevented.

In order to teach crop growers how best to protect their fields against damage by smuts there has been issued by the Department of Agriculture a comprehensive, plainly written treatise which is issued as bulletin No. 73, of the Experimental Farms. The author, Mr. H. T. Gussow, Dominion botanist, has gone into the subject very thoroughly, not only describing the smuts, in their various stages, that affect wheat, barley, oats, corn and millet, but attention is given to methods of infection as well as the prevention measures and curative remedies that have been found useful. The text, which occupies about fifty pages, is much helped by numerous illustrations. This work is being sent out free to all who apply for it to the publication branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

### A TAX ON BABIES!

#### French Woman's Plan for Perfecting the Race.

A tax on babies! That is the remedy proposed by Mme. du Morier, of Versailles. Mme. du Morier declares that if parents had to pay a tax on babies people would think more carefully before bringing "little strangers" into the world, and that it would be one step forward to "better babies."

This would not be the first tax on babies, however, for in 1895 there was an actual tax on babies in England. A tax of two shillings had to be paid at the birth of each baby. This fell very heavily upon the parents, for at that time a shilling meant much more than it does to-day. The nobility, too, felt the burden of the taxes, for each baby was taxed according to rank, and the birth of a child of a duke added thirty pounds to the revenue.

Beards were once the subject of taxation. In the time of Peter the Great each man was taxed one hundred rubles if he wore a beard. Queen Elizabeth put a tax upon beards, too, and each man was taxed three farthings for a beard of a fortnight's growth.

### Rock Paintings in Tunisia.

Rock paintings of an interesting kind in the south region of Tunisia are described by M. Henri Roux and published in the Revue Tunisienne. One of these was noticed on a rock wall in the Djebel Bilij, which probably represents a combat of men in conventional drawing and animals which it is difficult to identify. The age of this painting raises quite a controversy among scientists, and some think that it is contemporary with the Barber civilization, that is, intermediate between the stone age and the age of metals. According to this idea it belongs in the last part of the neolithic period. But M. Roux wishes to place it at a more ancient epoch and class it in the middle or first part of a civilization which is more ancient than the Barbers, and M. Gobert also thinks that it is the work of negro people to whom are due the flints of the neolithic age found in North Africa.

### STRANGE AUSTRALIAN FISH.

A new species of fish having the appearance of an electrically lighted ferryboat has been secured in the Australian light at the great depth of 350 fathoms.

This curious fish, which has 53 brilliant light organs on either side of its body, which itself shines like a mirror, has been named the eudor. It was hauled to the surface by the trawler Endeavor, and will be placed on exhibition at the Australian Museum at Sydney.

More than a hundred other entirely new varieties were obtained, all the specimens inhabiting these submarine depths being more or less luminous.

Several fish of a jet black color, with a skin like velvet studded all over with scintillating encrustations of bluish light, were also obtained some being shaped like a pair of bellows.

### VACCINATION.

(Philadelphia Record)

Two vaccinated children have died, and the anti-vaccinationists will be aroused to renewed attacks upon a preventive measure which has reduced the most frightful scourge of humanity to so rare an occurrence that physicians often fail to recognize it when they encounter it. But these children scratched the vaccination spots that admitted germs to the wounds, and hence disease and death. Most of the fatalities following vaccination are due to tampering with the spots, and many parents are careless in preventing this and in keeping the children clean.

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
