Mrs. John McCarter and Mrs. Joseph Long of Port Dover spent a day with their mother here last week.

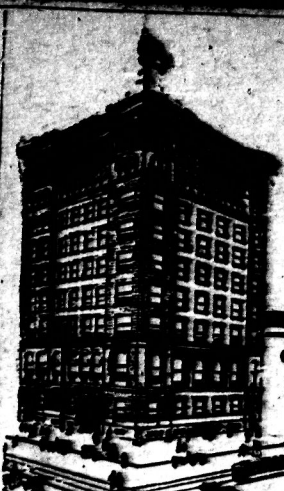
