Haldimand Educational Association

The Haldimand Educational Association met in convention in the Public School, Hagersville, on the 2nd and 3rd of October. Miss Le-nora Allen, President, occupied the chair during the convention. She performed the duties of Chairman in a manner satisfactory to the Association and creditable to herself. Ninety per cent of the teachers were in attendance. The non-attendance of ten per cent may be attributed to lack of interest in their work.

The Convention opened at 11 o'clock on Thursday morning by devotional exercises conducted by the Rev. Mr. Leake.

After the minutes of the last meeting was read and adopted and after the miscellaneous business, such as appointing committees, etc., was disposed of, the convention adjourned until 1.30 p.m.

At the opening of the second Session, Mr. Rivers, Principal of Hagersville Public School, at the request of the President, gave an address of welcome to the members of the Association. The welcome extended to the teachers was no formal affair, as they had the freedom of the town.

Mr. E. T. Seaton, B. A. of the Hamilton Normal School was introduced to the Association. He discussed the subject of "Recent Tendencies in Arithmetic" under the following heads:

- 1—Purpose, Culture and Utility ideas affect methods in teaching.
- 2—Use of concrete material.
- 3—Value of oral work in introducing each topic.
- 4—The relation of problems to the pupils' life and experience.
- 5—The value of good methods.
- 6—Rapidity and accuracy in the solution of problems.

Mr. Walter Ferguson, Principal of Caledonia Public School, took as his subject "Junior Entrance." He discussed the report that must be submitted to the Entrance Board by the teachers and the impossibility of the teachers being able to comply with the conditions of the report.

"School Gardens" were discussed by Mr. Clark Moses under the following heads:

- 1—Preparation of the grounds.
- 2—Size and selection of the garden.
- 3—Teachers' and pupils' work in the garden.
- 4—Kind of seeds to sow.
- 5—Care of the school gardening.
- 6—Forestry as a part of school gardening.
- 7—Hindrances and helps in school gardening.
- 8—Improvements in school grounds.

Mr. J. H. Laughton, representative of the trustees of Ontario on the Advisory Council being present gave the teachers some good advice from the standpoint of a trustee. Mr. Laughton's address was practical and was well received by the teachers.

The Third Session was held in the Methodist Church. The musical part of the programme was given by Misses Smith and Bennetts and Miss Margaret Dixon of Caledonia. The numbers given by Miss Dixon were much appreciated by the audience, as evinced by the hearty encores she received.

The literary parts were given by Messrs. Seaton and Laughton. Mr. Seaton, by means of the blackboard, gave illustrations of oddities in Arithmetic. Mr. Laughton was introduced by the Chairman as the Trustees' representative on the Advisory

Council and President of the Ontario Educational Association in 1912.

Certainly Mr. Laughton knew of which he spoke. Having been a member of the school in Parkhill for several years, he was able to give trustees and school supporters some good advice.

Mr. Robertson, of the High School Board occupied the Chair during the evening session and proved himself to be the right man in the right place.

On Friday morning, the Convention opened by an address by R. E. Coombs, B. A. of the University Schools and Faculty of Education, Toronto. He took as his subject "Reading" and discussed it under the following heads:

- 1—Voice Culture
- 2—Voice Production
- 3—Psychology of reading, grasp the thought and enter into the feelings of the Author.
- 4—Fundamentals must be sought for first, accessories last.
- 5—Mastery of thought.
- 6—Word values in reading.—Words are something to look through, not something to look at.
- 7—Power to visualize.
- 8—Power of concrete thought.
- 9—Self expression, the true basis of oral expression.
- 10—The mastery of reading, the power to think concretely and abstractly.

"Nature Study" was discussed by T. J. Hicks, B. A. of Caledonia High School. Mr. Hicks presented this subject in a most practical manner. "Present Aims in Education" was taken by Mr. Seaton and was presented to the Association as follows:

- 1—Get sympathy established between teacher and pupil, no good work can be done except teacher and pupil are in sympathy with each other.
- 2—The school surroundings should be the best.

- (a) Beautiful school grounds.
- (b) Up-to-date school house.
- (c) Beautiful school room, ornamented by pictures, flowers, etc.

Mr. H. M. King, B. Sc. Haldimand Representative of the Department of Agriculture was the first speaker on Friday afternoon. His subject was "School Fairs". Mr. King outlined the work he was expected to do for the farmers of the County of Haldimand. He asserted his willingness to assist the teachers in their work along the lines of school gardens. He was particularly interested in "School Fairs". To the County of Haldimand this is a new feature in school work. Mr. King will bring School Fairs to a successful issue. He has the hearty co-operation of the teachers and Inspector, and it is needless to say that he will have the hearty cooperation of the trustees and all the other farmers of the County, seeing that School Fairs are so closely related to the work on the farm. A township or district of the County will be organized and a School Fair will be held in the Autumn of 1914.

Composition was the next subject discussed by Mr. Coombs. He presented this subject before the Association under the following heads:

- 1—Kind of stories.
- 2—Value of Fairy Stories
