COUNTY COUNCIL

September 30th, 1913.
Council met at the call of the Warden, pursuant to adjournment. All members were present the first day, except Messrs. Buckner, Holmes and McBurney. All members were present the second day, except Mr. McBurney.
The minutes of the former meeting were read.
Smelser-Hornbrook.—That the minutes of the former meeting as read be confirmed.
The following communications were read:
From the Warden, County of Grey, A. & C. Martindale, H. Arzell, R. W. Bruce Smith, S. W. Brown, commit-tees 2 Latham and Page; Messrs. Murphy & Colter.
Werner-Shipway.—That the action of the Warden and Treasurer in taking up three thousand dollars at the Canadian Bank of Commerce on account of the \$10,000 loan, under by-law of July 25th, 1913, for the current expenses of the County be and the same is hereby approved and confirmed.—Carried.
Sorge-Bain.—That the by-law numbered 522, passed on the 25th July, 1913, to borrow \$10,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce be amended by cancelling the word "five" where it refers to the rate of interest to be paid on the loan and the word "six" be written in place thereof.—Carried.
Werner-Kett.—That the Council adjourn to meet the several committees to meet.—Carried.

October 1st, 1913.
Sorge-Avery.—That this Council resume business with the Warden in the chair.—Carried.
Avery-Hornbrook.—That the report of the Goods Roads Committee be received and read.—Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council of Haldimand, be leave to report as follows:

Gentlemen.—Your Good Roads Committee met on Monday, September 29th, to open tenders for 2 1/2 miles of road that was advertised to be let by tender in three sections. Namely—Nos. 1 and 2 sections being on the old plank road running through the villages of Caledonia, Hagersville and Jarvis. No. 3 section being part of Pellet Road commencing at the East side of the Town of Cayuga, running to the village of Canboro. And the work to be let in one or three separate contracts and the contractors to have three years to complete the work.
There were seven tenders received for the construction of the above roads and also two alternative tenders offering the substitution of one of the binders that are used in constructing roads, namely, rock, mac and tarvia. And after considering the tenders the Committee do not feel that they can recommend the adoption of water bound macadam and would instead recommend that a deputa-tion be appointed to inquire into the different kinds of binders and to ascertain the views of the Government on the subject.
Therefore, if another binder be decided upon they would recommend that the contractors who tendered on water bound macadam roads be given an opportunity to retender on the binder decided upon.
We recommend the Good Roads accounts to the Finance Committee for payment. That the account re. A. & C. Martindale, for stone taken out of the river for road, no action be taken.
The Committee met since the last meeting of the Council and purchased one 20-horse power steam hauling engine from J. I. Case Co. Also one concrete mixer from Bailey Jones, Caledonia. That we also recommend the return of the checks to the different contractors that tendered.
All of which we respectfully submit.—Wm. Walton, Chairman.
Hornbrook-Kett.—That the report of the Good Roads Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.
Bain-Sorge.—That Messrs. Roultou, Walton and Avery be a Committee to investigate accounts in connection with Good Roads for the purpose of

arriving at the approximate cost per mile and report at next meeting.—Carried.

Sorge-Bain.—That the report of Road and Bridge Committee be received and read.—Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Your Road and Bridge Committee beg leave to report as follows.—The repairs to the abutment at east end of Cayuga bridge have been completed and we recommend that Frank McMullen be paid balance of contract sum, amounting to \$584.00 and that five hundred dollars be paid J. A. Murphy re. assignment, making a total of \$1,084.00.
That Leonard Escher be paid the sum of \$81.00 for grading and fencing at east end of Cayuga bridge.
That Gallagher Creek bridge has been finished, that the Engineer's report attached hereto shows that the plan has not been strictly adhered to by the contractor, but as the total amount of concrete in the bridge was not diminished, he doesn't take any exception to this, and recommends payment to Mr. Lishman of full contract sum, \$500.00. We accepted Andrew Winger's tender of \$750 for concrete work on bridge over Boston Creek bridge on Indian Line between the Townships of Walpole and Tuscorora.

Dear Mr. Bain.—I went on Saturday at the request of the Contractor and inspected the Gallagher Creek bridge, which is now completed. I found the appearance of the concrete quite satisfactory. I found that the Contractor had not adhered exactly to the plan in constructing the arch, that is he has not formed the spandrel walls which were shown on the plan, but as he has instead increased the thickness of the concrete at the springing of the arch I do not take any exception to this. The concrete deck which was shown over the top of the spandrel walls, has not been built, but as I understand Mr. Cline did not wish this added, I suppose the contractor is not responsible for the omission. I consider the work quite satisfactory and would recommend payment to the contractor of the contract sum. The footing was carried much deeper than was shown on the plan, so that the total amount of concrete in the bridge was not diminished.
I have not yet heard from you regarding the Boston Creek job. I have ordered steel from the Hamilton Bridge Works and am anxious to hear what you intend doing about the abutments.
